

## WAXHAW DOING GOOD BUSINESS

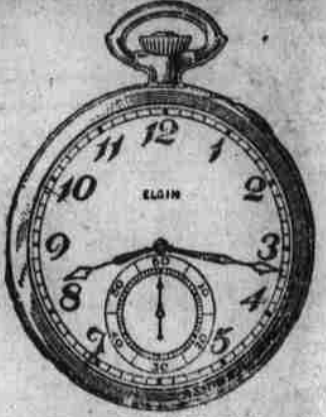
Merchants Are Sharing in General Prosperity—Social and Religious News

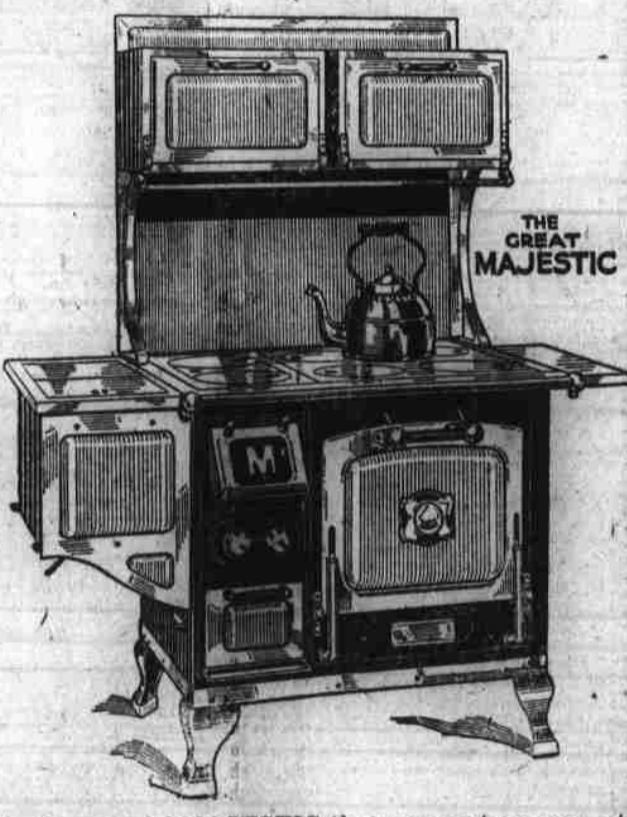
