EDITORIAL GLEANINGS.

Made, Improved and Stolen

The legislature of each State should pass a law for the establishment and maintenance of good roads. Let the people of town or city unite with the farmer in agitating the matter and a millennium of good roads is not far off.

The twentieth Annual State Convention of the Young Men's Christian Associations of North Carolina will be held March 19th to 22d at Charlotte. An interesting program is being prepared. Some speakers have already agreed to be present. Every Association in the state should be represented by as many delegates as possible.

J. C. Logan Harris, of Raleigh, writes that a number of prominent Republicans have written Chairman Holton, of the Republican Executive committee, requesting him to call a meeting at an early day. It is generally understood that ten of the fifteen members of the Republican Executive Committee are Russell men. The Wilmington Star says two are for Jim Boyd, one for Oliver Dockery and two are non-committal. Of the six colored members, five are for Russell and one doesn't know who he is for.

Senator Mills, of Texas, has been "jolly" by the republicans unparagonably about that House tariff bill, now in the Senate. He offers his congratulations to the republicans of the House for having, after many years abuse of the democratic idea of a tariff for revenue only, passed the only strictly revenue tariff bill that ever went through either branch of Congress. The republicans try to escape the charge of inconsistency by claiming the bill to be an "emergency" measure, but the claim does not work.

The Republicans of North Carolina are doing a good deal of kicking against Russell and Congressman Settle, the statement being made that "their self evident bossism," writes Col. Olds to the Richmond Dispatch. It is now quite well known that Republican Chairman A. E. Holton is an aspirant for the nomination of governor. One remarkable thing is that while some populists say there is to be cooperation between their party and the Republican, none of them will say that a Republican is to get the gubernatorial nomination.

The whip of the Quay-Platt-Reed combine seems to be just as effective among the republicans of the Senate as it was in the House, but it had to be heavily laid upon some of the republican Senators before they would agree to support the tariff bill arranged by Mr. Reed and passed by his House, without amendment. They swore through two long caucuses that some McKinley amendments should be attached to the bill or they would not support it, but at the third caucus Boss Quay's wedding of the combine whip was more than they could stand and they agreed to support the bill without amendment, thus scoring another decisive victory for victory for the Quay-Platt-Reed combine. But this does not make it certain that Mr. Reed's tariff bill will pass the Senate. Some votes will have to be gotten either from the democrats or the populists to pass it, and if passed President Cleveland will never sign it.

Judge Russell is being bitterly opposed for the Republican nomination for Governor by prominent colored men throughout the State. Mr. Russell, two years ago, wrote a very caustic letter about the negro in which he said, in substance, that they were savages. This raised their ire and it has been known that when he popped up his head as a candidate they would hit at him. Whether they can hit him hard enough to defeat his nomination is the question, for if they do not get in their work before the convention they will be left, for once nominated every man of them will eat crow. All this talk about the colored vote being a bolt in the trash—he votes straight every time.

What will the Republican papers now do, which have so persistently abused Cleveland for issuing bonds? The new Republican "relief bill" provides for issuing "gold bonds," and a horizontal advance in taxation of 15 per cent. That is the "relief bill" in a nutshell. This bill passed the Republican House under one of Czar Reed's gag laws—cutting off debate. The Republicans thus go further than Cleveland ever dared to. They raise taxation on top of "gold bonds." The Democrats voted solidly against the bill, as did some of the Populists. And yet the Republican hirelings and their sheets do nothing in this country but denounce "gold bug Clevelandism" "hard times," and praise up "fusion" and Republicanism.

There are lots of lawyers in the House, and one exception against the constitutionality of the income tax was a mistaken one, but Senator Vest is the first one of them who has openly attacked the decision. In the course of a speech, answering Senator Sherman's recent financial speech, Senator Vest said of it: "In my judgment no judgment has ever in the history of the country been rendered which has done as much to destroy the influence of that high tribunal and excite distrust on the part of the people of this country." He declared that he would not trust the majority in the Senate what he thought of that decision but would leave it to members of the court who dissent to retroact, and he read from two of those opinions. Referring to the effect of the decision he said: "It marks a new era, and I greatly mistake if the time does not come when neither soft words nor honeyed praises will prove a sufficient apology."
