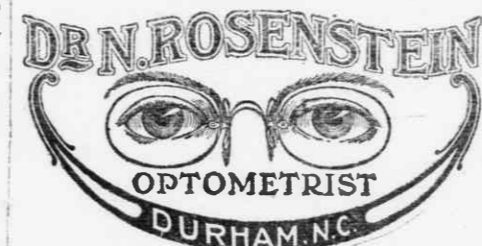
## Was The Brake Tamped With.

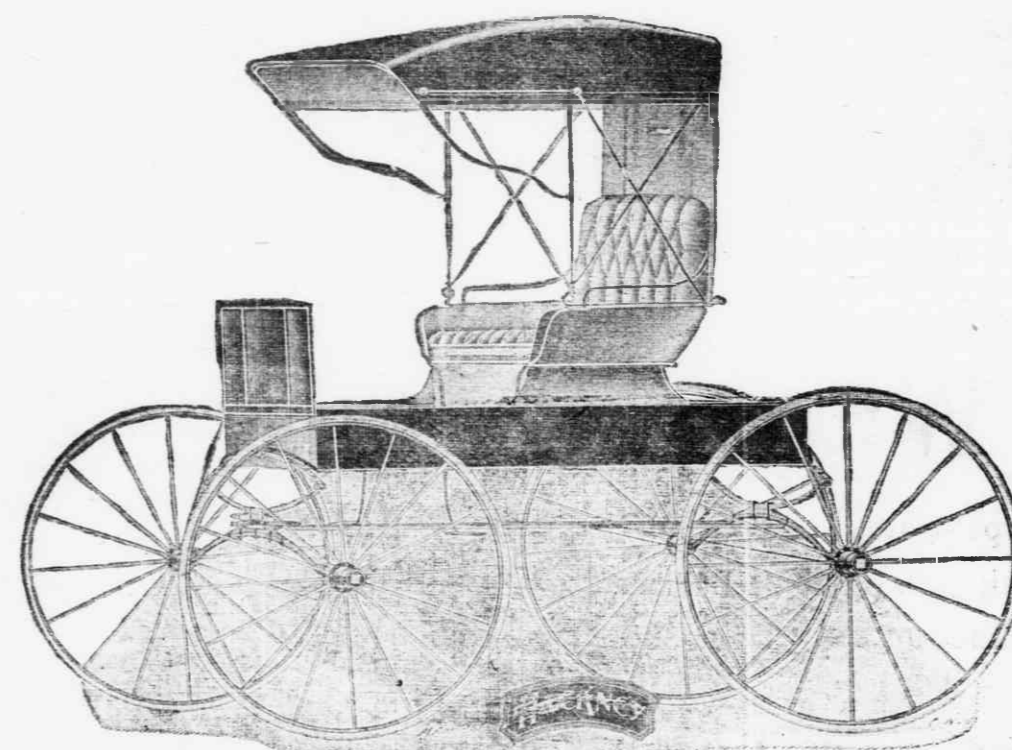
