The Nimble Die.

It is a fact that while patient, self-conscious truth stops to pull on its boots, a lie will forge ahead at least a league. A lie told by a deliberate liar may be told so often that he may begin to believe it true, and careless ones who do not mean to lie will accept a lie as the truth.

It is recalled that when the giant steamer Titanic went down in the cold waters with its vast aggregate of human freight, it was told that Maj. Butt, who was among the last ones, had been sent by President Taft to the pope of Rome, and that he was returning with an edict from the pope to vote against Woodrow Wilson for the presidency.

The Titanic went down on the 14th of May and Mr. Wilson was not nominated as the Democratic candidate for president until the 2nd day of the following July. That of itself is sufficient to prove the statement a lie.

It was claimed as evidence that a copy of the command of the pope was found on the body of Maj. Butt after he was drowned. But the body of the gallant major was not found and, of course, no such paper found on the body.

President Taft made positive denial that Maj. Butt had gone on any such a mission as that charged, and that is positive evidence that there was no foundation for the false statement.

But notwithstanding all this entirely conclusive evidence, the lie is still occasionally repeated, and it has been done by ministers of the gospel of truth, who should know it to be untrue.

All of which goes to prove that a lie, when it gets a start, may never be overtaken by the truth. But men who carelessly tell a lie, when by a little investigation they might know it to be a lie are not to be held guiltless.

The Hero of the Hour in Northern Mexico.

After you cross the border you realize that Villa (pronounced Vea) is the hero of the hour in northern Mexico. He is the bandit whom Huerta once ordered executed, and was saved by Madero. Huerta made Villa salute the flag, so to speak and now Huerta has the same medicine offered him. Villa's father ran two butcher shops in Chihuahua, and the young lad of 15 or 16 used to go far afield in the country to buy goats and cattle. He was an expert in picking out cattle in the regular channels of trade and a regular expert in picking them out in other ways, but Villa has one idea at a time. He was a good horseman, and after he had shot a Mexican officer who had seduced his sister, he became an outlaw and was as familiar with one side of the border as the other, and could almost claim Texas citizenship as far as length of residence is concerned. Porfirio Diaz tried to catch him, but he laughed at him, for the people admired the bold bandit. This wounded the pride of the rurales, but once, near the outskirts of Chihuahua he agreed to fight their officers one by one, and three accepted his challenge—and the three fell before the pistol of Villa, for he has faith in his destiny. They never did catch him and he was about the only bandit at large when Madero enlisted his support for the constitutionists' cause and pardoned him when the revolution proved successful. Villa was as notorious a bandit as the American Jesse James.
