MEBANE LEADER MAKES SOME CHANGES.

It was with the deepest regret that the press of the country and the laymen learned of the death of Mr. F. W. R. Hinman, business manager of the Florida Times-Union and president of the Southern Newspaper Press Association, by being shot by a irresponsible passenger on board a steamer off the coast of North Carolina last Wednesday. Mr. Hinman was one of the most noted newspaper men in the country. While he was not liked by a great many people, he was a man of unusual abilities and profound knowledge in his line of work. Mr. Hinman was honest and conscientious in all his convictions. While he was connected with the above named paper it grew in prestige and worth.

No, the amendments did not carry, but don't say the other fellow did not have any sense just because he did not vote as you did, whether you voted for them or against them. Every man has a right to vote as he pleases and don't get mad with him because his views are antagonistic to yours. We favored all the amendments, however, we do not think there was but one that was really worth considering and that was the taxation amendment. When it comes to a rotten system of taxation, we do not suppose that North Carolina hardly has a parallel.

When one comes to think of the horrible war that is now raging in the old world it almost makes the hair rise on your head to think of the uncalled for massacre of human beings. Knowing too that it was brought on by those who do not have to undergo the hardships that it has brought on the humble poor man, the innocent children and suffering mothers and wives. The great ruler sits up in his throne, surrounded with all the luxurious things that tends to happiness. Would to God that those fellows in high authority were made to go out in the battle ground and fight as privateers - let him for awhile have to endure some of the hardships that his subjects and countrymen are having to undergo. We say that

if these mighty Lords had to encounter some of these difficulties and hardships for only a very short while they would be ready to have peace. We had once thought that man had become too much civilized to engage in such fearful slaughtering of his fellowman. Would it not be wise to send some missionaries over to Germany? May God in His infinite love and wisdom cause this blood to cease to flow.

The State University through its wider interest in State affairs is preparing to send out into the State experts on any line that a community desires. You send your child to Sunday school on Sunday, and there he is taught the great lessons, the great miracles that Christ performed. He learns how God made man and Monday he goes to school and has to swallow some of the polluted theories that are advanced in such sulphurous text books as Tarr's Physical Geography. Science has been of marvelous aid to the physician. It has helped him to fathom and delve down into the most intricate, and what was once thought to be impossible laws of surgery and medicine. It has been the direct cause of bringing out the most latent powers that lay hidden in man. But away with such science that is so unfounded and so groundless as that which we have just mentioned. The people should without a dissenting voice rise up and condemn such a theory that is not based on the least particle of common sense. If we do not believe all of the Bible there is no need in believing any of it.

Now let us add the following sentence: That no book of the type of Tarr's Physical Geography, will be introduced in the school that is dearest to our heart - the Mebane Graded School.
