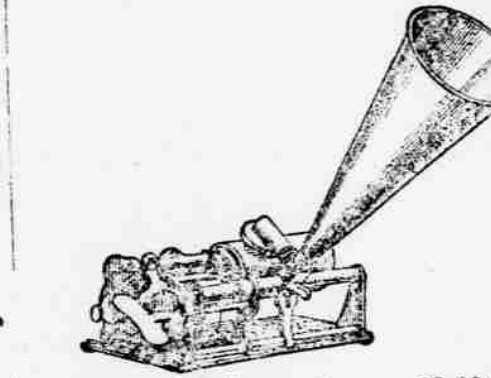

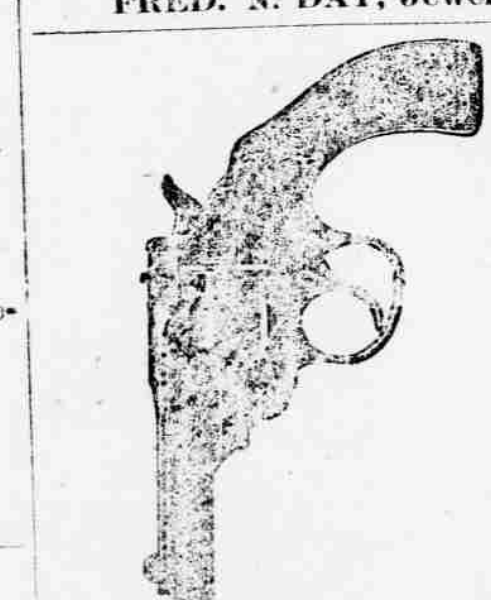

### THE SUPREME COURT.

The State Supreme Court appears to have gone Republican yesterday in all of the political cases before it.—Charlotte Observer.

The above is in line with Democratic inconsistency, and is a little surprise to us that our usually fair friend, Caldwell, goes so strongly Democratic in these political cases.

If one will take the trouble to look over the files of Democratic papers for 1897, and see that this same court was lauded and highly commended for deciding adversely to the claims of Populists and Republicans, who were in the same position of our Democratic friends to-day, one will be able to judge of their very great inconsistency in such cases, and will readily see that it makes a big difference whose side is good.

The opinion written by Judge Furches is concise and to the point, and while he may have committed an indiscretion in alluding to the motives which actuated the Legislature, we all know that he simply stated a fact—a fact which no one can truthfully controvert or deny.

The very same rule applies to the former Legislature, which attempted to turn out Democrats and install Populists and Republicans in their stead. If the court's decisions were legal and just then, they are equally legal and just now; in other words, "what is sauce for the goose is sauce for the gander," and no fair-minded man should criticize the court for deciding a case according to the judgment of a majority of the court, especially when the decision is in line with the court's former decisions in such cases.

Justice Clark, in his dissenting opinion, steps beyond what we have all along thought was true of the jurisdiction and power of a Supreme Court. We have all along thought the Supreme Court was a co-ordinate branch of the State government, and that when the executive or legislative departments exceeded its authority, the court stepped in and laid down the law.

In other words, each branch is co-existent and is independent of the other, and the constitution is the supreme law of the land, and the Supreme Court is vested with the power to construe the acts of the others. If this be not true, the legislative branch of the government could pass any kind of law, and the executive, on the other hand, could usurp the rights of the other two branches, and there would be no remedy, save a resort to force and revolution. The Supreme Court is the arbiter of all disputed points arising between the other branches, and when the courts exceed their constitutional rights, a remedy is provided. In our form of government, no branch can usurp the powers and rights of the other, without placing itself in a position to be dealt with by one or the other branch. The legislative branch can expel one of its own members; it can impeach the governor or the judges of our courts. The wisdom of our fathers in thus providing means of checking and holding each branch of the government within reasonable bounds, is the bulwark of our safety and liberties. According to Justice Clark's opinion, the legislative branch is supreme, and the courts have no right to interfere with a law passed by that august body. The constitution can be overturned, laws can be passed depriving persons of their rights, their property and liberties, and we must submit, and wait for a subsequent Legislature to right the wrong done by a former Legislature! The subsequent Legislature might not feel disposed to act; then where is your remedy? Force and revolution seems the only remedy in such a case.

No one will gainsay the right of the people to complain and criticize a court for an unjust or unrighteous

decision, but the motive actuating the court should first be determined; and we should presume a good rather than a bad motive, in absence of proof. Man is human and liable to err, but we should not be harsh in passing judgment upon others, for we all err at times. "God reigns and the government still lives," and we should, as good citizens, uphold law and order, and forever bless our forefathers for establishing a form of government that gives to every man a remedy for every wrong. And whenever the courts become subordinate to the other branches of the government, liberty, justice and right will forever take their flight, and anarchy, chaos and revolution will reign supreme.

In conclusion, may the press of the State wield its power and influence always in behalf of the right, regardless of political consequences. The rights, the liberties, and the welfare of the people is more important than the success of any political party.

We are now gravely told, and it is emblazoned upon the records of our highest court, to go swinging down the ages with more or less alarm to skittish generations yet unborn, that our courts have no right, implied, expressed or winked at, to stay the execution of a bad act of a bad legislative body; that the only relief the people as a body politic or as individuals can get is through other representatives elected to a succeeding legislature.—Morning Post, Dem.

The Post is the only Democratic paper which we have read that takes the same view of Justice Clark's opinion that THE RECORD holds. The courts are not infallible, neither is Justice Clark or his legal opinions. All that we can wish or desire in such matters, is that justice be done, regardless of parties or politics. He who wants more is not honest with himself or the people. Justice and right, may it ever prevail, regardless of the world, the flesh and the devil!
