-----THE WILSONS SUSTAINED

WE BELIEVED THE LEGISLATURE WOULD DO THE RIGHT THING AND WERE NOT DISAPPOINTED.

The following information reserved to-day was gratifying to many Morgantonians : The joint session of the Legislature on the cases of J. W. Wilson and S. Otho Wilson, ex-railroad commissioners, met vesterdav afternoon and continued until after 3 o'clock this morning. Argument was heard from counsel on both sides. by legislators in the presence of packed galleries. The committee report vindicating and re-instating the Wilsons, was adopted, 83 to 56 in favor of Maj. Wilson and 78 to 54 in favor of Otho Wilson. The resignation of Otho Wilson was then immediately accepted This action gives both the Wilsons back pay along with vindication. Neither is a candidate for re-election.
