The Sick Pensions—Died of Pneumonia—Mrs. Crisp Falls and Breaks Her Leg.

Mr. J. A. Puett, of Burke, is spending a few weeks with his son, J. P. Puett, Esq., near town.

Mr. J. W. Edison, of Asheville, who one time lived in Lenoir, and did business for Mr. W. S. Covington, was in Lenoir this week. He brought home the remains of Mr. A. H. Barlow who died of pneumonia.

Caldwell gets this year \$1,232.50 from the State pension fund, and pays into that fund \$796.23. The amount for Caldwell is divided into 64 pensions of the fourth class, \$14.50, including 39 widows, and six of the 3rd, \$29, and 3 of the 2nd, \$43.50.

She walked out to feed the pigs and slipped on a smooth-dressed plank lying on the ground and fell, breaking both bones of her ankle about four inches above the joint. Dr. Kent attended her and she is doing well.

Messrs. James Harrington, Ben Martin and Carter Council, who have been seriously ill for some time, are improving, so are Madames Pickens and E. A. Abernethy. Miss Dora Tuttle is confined to her home with rheumatism and Rev. J. L. Healan continues in a precarious condition. George Bernhardt and Mr. J. T. Spencer's little son, both of whom had pneumonia, are about well again, and Frances Atkinson is holding her own, so to speak. Her symptoms upon the whole, being favorable.
