THE FAMOUS FAIRY STONES.

The Queer Little Crystals Which are Found in Patrick County, Va.

Mr. Powhatan Bouldin, of Stuart, Va., contributes the following article to the Scientific American:
The Blue Ridge and Alleghany mountains unite a little north of the county of Patrick, Virginia, and hence in that county they constitute only one mountain.

Stuart, a pretty little town seventy-five miles west of Danville, is the county seat of Patrick and the terminus of the Danville and Western railroad. The distance from Stuart to the top of the mountain is ten miles, over an admirably constructed turnpike, and the scenery all along the road is exceedingly picturesque. When the traveler reaches the summit of the mountain, 3,000 feet above the level of the sea, he naturally expects to descend on the other side; but, greatly to his surprise, he finds himself in a rather level country, the soil of which is well adapted to the cultivation of grain, grass and vegetables.

That portion of this remarkable plateau which lies in the county of Patrick is called the Meadows of Dan. In the meadows are innumerable springs of pure water, the temperature of which is 50 degrees in summer. In less than fifteen minutes the traveler crosses twelve different streams, all rising on top of the mountain, and all flowing through these beautiful table lands. One of these streams (the river Dan) joins the Staunton and forms the Roanoke, which empties into Albemarle sound. Another, (the Ararat) flows into the Yadkin which joins the Great Pee Dee, in South Carolina, and with this runs into the Atlantic ocean. The waters of another empty into New River and finally reach the Gulf of Mexico.

All the things that I have enumerated are highly interesting, but nothing that I have seen in Patrick county has interested me so much as its fairy stones.

These curious little crystals are found in only three other States besides Virginia, in no other county in Virginia but Patrick, and nowhere else in Patrick but on and along Bull Mountain, a spur of the Blue Ridge running twenty miles through the county. The fairy stones found elsewhere, judging from the specimens exhibited at the Atlanta and Nashville expositions, are not at all comparable to those found on Bull Mountain. To a few of the people of Patrick they have been known for a long time, but not until about ten years ago did they come into public notice. Some of these stones which have been analyzed contained titanite, tourmaline, garnet, aluminum, and staurolite, titanite being the principal material.

Geologists say that they are crystals. Most of them have crosses, some, what is called the Roman; some, the Maltese; some, the St. Andrew's; and some crosses for which there are no names. Those which have crosses are pretty stones of different forms. Frequent-ly two, three or four, are joined together. Some are killed with a hammer. Some are so brittle that they might imitate a piece of wood; but it would be most skillful

Woke Up in His Coffin.

J. C. Clark, an aged inmate of the Soldiers' Home at Dodge City, Kansas, apparently died from typhoid fever and his body was prepared for burial by his friends and comrades. After it was placed in the coffin the lid was closed, but not fastened, as many were desirous of seeing the face of their friend before the interment.

The coffin rested on two chairs in a darkened room. The doors were closed and the watchers retired for the night to adjoining rooms. About midnight a great noise was heard in the room where the corpse had been placed and consternation followed. The persons in the house rushed to the door and beheld the "corpse" sitting upright on the floor and the coffin by his side, which, in his attempts to get out of had fallen to the floor.

Frightened at what appeared to them to be a ghost, the attendants ran from room to room, telling what they had seen. Other persons ran in and found the "corpse" prone on the floor, but with evidences of life. He was carried to a bed and restoratives applied.

With careful nursing Clark was brought back, as it were, from the dead. In a day or two he was able to converse with his friends and told them of his feelings while seemingly dying and returning to life again.

Clark says that the experience of dying was not an unpleasant one, and that he seemed to be free from all trouble and pain. He said the next thing he remembered was being in a coffin, and it at once came to him that he was about to be buried alive, so, with a mighty effort he tried to release himself, but at first could not move.

After a time he managed to raise one leg and tried to turn over, which he succeeded in doing, upsetting the coffin and extricating himself from it.

Porto Rico Furnishes a Fine Opportunity For Trade.

The pamphlet states in the very beginning that "the most potent way to extend trade with the island is by coming in contact with the Porto Rican as well as the Spanish merchant. It may be noticed that England, Germany, and France have observed this kind of policy in order to successfully capture the trade which previous to the war was almost controlled by them, and now that America will control the larger part of the trade in the island, it is worth while for the manufacturer in this country, if he wishes to expand or promote his business in the island, to be very particular in the way of conducting his business at the beginning, for the business people of Porto Rico have not been accustomed to rush, the majority of them having been spoiled by the European merchants; who, in order to captivate the trade, would allow them all sorts of conveniences.

"For the present all business transactions should be made in Spanish, for, although there is already a great demand for the English language, and many have already started to acquire in some way or other some English education, the business people of the country will not be trained to do business in a general American way for some time to come."

"It goes without saying," the pamphlet says, "that the Porto Rican and a large number of the organized Spanish merchants will prefer anything...

LIFE IN PERIL IN HAVANA.

The Cubans and Spaniards Alike Are Treacherous and Dangerous.

A late Havana special says: It now appears that the raising of the stars and stripes over Fort Atares by Major Russell B. Harrison was a surprise to both the United States and the Spanish military commis-sion. It had been agreed that the flag should be raised after a certain date, but Major Harrison, who was told by a detachment of the First North Carolina Infantry, had done so and raised the flag in full sight of the harbor and though it has continued in order and city, the Spaniards have complained and it was not Gen. Brooke.

Washington special says Major John C. Bates assumed command of the new military department at Cienfuegos, Cuba, January 1st. Brig. Gen. Joseph Sanger was temporarily assigned to the command of the military department of Matanzas, Cuba. These assignments complete the detail of officers to command the various army departments in Cuba, under the supreme command of Major General Brooke. President McKinley has issued orders for the relief of the on line and diseased Cubans, having telegraphed Major General Lee to December 23rd to begin at once the distribution of needed supplies to the destitute in and around the city of Havana, as he was desirous of relieving the suffering of the thirty thousand sufferers in the city and neighborhood before the ordinary holidays. All the military commanders in Cuba were also ordered to organize relief distributions, and, as far as possible, to give back to any of the destitute who could be able to do it. On December 24th Gen. Lee sent the following telegram to the Secretary of War: "Over seven thousand rations have been distributed to Havana, and about 10,000 more are also being distributed to the destitute children."
