Frank H. Curtis, Nov. 30. Supt. Schools.

Supt. Curtis Twice Honored.

Supt. F. H. Curtis, of the Mt. Airy City Schools, has been invited to deliver an address before the Southern Educational Association which will meet in Richmond, Va., Dec. 27th, 28th and 29th. His subject is "Flexible Grading." This is the largest gathering of the kind in the United States outside of the National Educational Association, and a most elaborate programme has been prepared for the occasion.

The following North Carolinians will deliver addresses at Richmond: "Universities and Secondary Schools," by President F. P. Venable, of the University of North Carolina; "Flexible Grading," Prof. F. H. Curtis, Mt. Airy; "College Degrees," President Chas. E. Taylor, Wake Forest College; "Relation of History and Literature in the High School," Prof. J. T. Foust, Goldsboro; "The Work of the Normal Schools as the College Man Sees It," Dr. Eben Alexander, of the University of North Carolina; "The Function of the Normal School," Prof. P. P. Claxton, of the State Normal and Industrial College, Greensboro.

Supt. Curtis has also been invited to deliver an address before the City Superintendents of North Carolina, which body will meet in Raleigh, Jan. 18th and 19th. The invitation has been accepted and Prof. Curtis will speak on "The City Superintendent—His Work and what the Public has a right to expect from him."
