Application of four-wheel brakes will decrease skidding. That has been proven with the automobiles that are equipped with brakes on the front as fell as rear wheels.

Front Wheels Hold.

When the brakes are applied suddenly to the rear wheels of a fast moving car, all the weight and momentum of the car are thrown forward, and the front wheels grip the pavement. If there is the slightest turn of the steering wheel at that time, the rear wheels will skid dangerously while the front wheels hold

Application of brakes on the front wheels at the same time obviates this danger. As the brake pressure is divided evenly among all four wheels, the weight of the machine is equally distributed so that the possibility of skidding is diminished.
