Two Services Each Day at 4 Churches. Six Noon Hour Services Each Day.

Never before in the history of Mt. Airy has such a united effort been put forth to concentrate the religious forces of the town for one week.

Special services began in all the churches Sunday morning to last eight days, some may continue a few days longer if it seems best.

The local pastors have prayed and preached for weeks to prepare their congregations for this great campaign. As a result, the morning congregations at all the churches have been a revelation to all who felt that people would not turn out in large numbers for a service at 8 A. M.

In the First Baptist church, Dr. E. D. Poe of Temple Baptist church, Durham, a gifted and able speaker is drawing large crowds while the local pastor Rev. E. I.
