NEW HOME FOR JACKSON BROTHERS

Growing Mercantile Concern Now Occupies One of Best Department Store Buildings in the State.

The opening of Jackson Bros. department store Friday marked a real epoch in the history of Mount Airy.

For several months their new building of pressed brick with granite foundation and trimmings has been under construction on the corner of Main street, opposite the bank.

The building is constructed with the most modern and approved department store facade, the entrance is through a large foyer flanked on the sides and rear by show windows.

Metal ceilings, large rear windows and mahogany finished woodwork feature the interior of the building on each floor. A splendid lighting system, an electric cash carrier system and steam heat also add to the comfort and convenience of the entire building.

An expert decorator from the National Advertising Service came here from Atlanta, Ga., to superintend the stupendous task of classifying and arranging the departments, as well as to add the finishing decorative touches that place this store among the leading department stores of the state in attractiveness as well as completeness.

On the main floor the notion department occupies the center of the building. Here glass counter vases hold everything from dainty lace collars, bracelets, and staple notions to talcum powder, soaps, combs, creams and perfumes.

On the right of the entrance is the men's wear department, glass front wall cases display, and at the same time protect, the better suits, hats and shirts, men's hosiery and underwear, jewelry and notions are also found on this side of the house, in fact a complete line of gents furnishings is handled with everything to supply the small boy's needs.

To the left of the entrance is the dry goods department, featuring a lovely line of silks, satins and woolsens, then the wash goods, table linens, and colored cotton fabrics.

At the rear on the left of the main floor is a well stocked department for ladies foot wear, where the newest and most up-to-date women's, misses, and children's shoes are to be found.

Entrance to the basement and also to the second floor is made at the rear of the building. On the first landing going to the second floor a large and commodious office is located, and on the left the cashiers desk.

On the second floor Miss Martha Saunders is in charge of the ladies ready-to-wear and millinery department.

While Messrs J. A. and R. R. Jackson were north buying their large stock Miss Saunders was there selecting the cream of the market for this department. She is ably assisted in selling by Misses Eldridge, of Elkin, and Elizabeth Long of this city.

This department, besides having windows front and back, has a central skylight and has ample wall case and floor rack space to take care of their large stock of dresses, coats, suits, sweaters, furs hats, silk underwear, corsets, etc. Soft curtains, with over drape of blue and pots and vases of flowers, make this a very attractive department, four dressing rooms and triplicate mirrors add to the shopper's convenience, a ladies toilet is also open to the visitors to this department.

Each adult visitor to the ready-to-wear department on opening day received a neat aluminum pin tray while the little tots received a toy balloon.

A phonograph is also a part of the equipment in this department. In the basement a collection of bargains affords delight to the careful buyer, here also are found the quilts comforts and heavy staple dry goods and a wholesale jobbing department for dry goods and notions.

In short the whole family can be outfitted in this store, the conventional suit with hat and shoes for father, the snappy suit with all the extras for the son of college age, the plain suit or dress for mother with hat to match, for the young miss the latest sport or evening models in clothes, shoes and hosiery with leather or beaded bag to match, a nifty parasol, gloves, etc., or if it is evening clothes the finest underwear and everything needful even to the jewel set bracelet and combs, to harmonize with the gown selected, may be found here.
