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NO PROGRESS IS MADE IN SHEATSLEY MURDER

Authorities Can Find No Clue As to How Body of Minister's Wife Came to Be in Furnace

Columbia, O., Nov. 23.—Probe of the Sheatsley furnace mystery was at a standstill today while County Prosecutor John E. King and his aides awaited the report of experts, expected Monday or Tuesday. All efforts of investigators to ascertain how the body of Mrs. Addie Sheatsley, 56-year-old wife of the Rev. C. V. Sheatsley, pastor of Christ Evangelical Lutheran church, came to be in the furnace of the parsonage on November 17, have been futile. The body of the victim was found by the pastor late in the afternoon after he had spent the afternoon attending to business and pastoral calls. In a statement issued shortly after noon today, Prosecutor King declared that he and his aides have exhausted every clue that has been given them and that their investigation has been as complete as possible, with no result.

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FIRST '24 VICTIM OF CHAIR IN N. C.

Negro Confesses And Pays Penalty For Murder—Appeal Denied

Raleigh, Nov. 23.—Vance Morgan, negro, alias Vance Chyburn, was electrocuted at the state prison here this morning at 10:30 o'clock. A few minutes before the electrocution he confessed to his spiritual adviser that he killed Butler Funderburk, of whose murder he was convicted last July in the superior court of Union county.

Morgan stopped at the cell of each of the other prisoners in death row and bade them farewell. "Good-bye, Chatham; goodbye, old boy," Morgan shouted as he passed the cell of Chatham Evans, under death sentence in connection with the slaying of a public chauffeur in Nash county several months ago.

"Death Row" Speeds Him

That section of the prison where the tier of cells known as "death row" is located was filled with song and prayer from early this morning until just before Morgan started his silent march to the death chamber, the other nine negro inmates joining him in singing solemn hymns and punctuated his prayers with a chorus of "amen." Morgan did not show the slightest emotion as he walked into the death chamber and seated himself in the electric chair. He looked up at the spectators for an instant and then cast his eyes towards the rubber mat in front of the chair. He was quickly strapped into the chair, and Warden Samuel Busbee turned on the current which brought about Morgan's death one minute and forty-eight seconds later.

Nephew Was Witness

Ray Funderburk, superintendent of schools of Union county, nephew of the slain man, was a witness at the execution, as were sheriff Nevin and several other persons from Union county.

Butler Funderburk, who operated a store about four miles east of Monroe, was brutally murdered by being beaten to death with a wrench at his store on the night of November 30. Morgan was arrested on circumstantial evidence, charged with the killing. He was tried convicted and sentenced to death at the July term of Union county superior court.

Morgan, who was 23 years old and married, was the first victim of state execution that has taken place this year. He was the 20th victim during the Morrison administration.

Costly Prisoner

Elizabeth City, Nov. 23.—Bills amounting to \$3,286 for the hospital, medical expenses, surgeons fees of Jos Swindell and for the cost of guarding him while he was in the hospital as a result of being shot by J. D. Farrior, don't set well on the county commissioners, and they expect to have a long argument over the settlement of them when they meet on Monday.
