

Woman Fined \$10 On Charge of Violating "Gossip" Act

Owensboro, Ky., Dec. 3.—Mrs. Maud Basham, wife of a Daviess county farmer, was fined \$10 in police court yesterday following conviction on a charge of having violated the state "anti-gossiping act."

Conviction carries a penalty of \$10 to \$100 fine and 10 to 50 days in jail or both.

OFFICERS RELEASE 42 MULES FROM HARNESS

Owners Charged With Cruelty to Animals—Mules Described As Unfit For Work

Greensboro News, Dec. 6. Forty-two mules, their shoulders bloody and legs covered with unhealed sores, wholly unfit for heavy work, were taken out of harness Tuesday afternoon by Officers Glenn and Burnside of the local police department at the grading camp operated by Donnell and Weaver, grading contractors, in the northern section of the city.

The action of the officers in freeing the mules from further work came as the result of a series of investigations made in all grading camps in the city, and warrants were issued Wednesday afternoon for the arrest of the contractors. A few weeks ago local officers investigated another grading camp, freed a number of mules from service and issued warrants for the arrest of their owner, charging cruelty to animals. When Officers Glenn and Burnside entered the grading project Tuesday where the mules were employed in pulling heavy wheelers, there were 60 mules at work. Investigation, the officers claim, revealed that 42 of the animals were in such a condition that they could hardly carry on their work. The necks and shoulders of many of the animals, it was stated, were raw and bleeding. Large sores in many instances were discovered on the bodies of the animals, especially on the legs.

The animals were immediately released from harness at the request of the officers. In some instances the collars were stuck to the necks of the mules and were removed with difficulty, so great was the pain suffered by the animals, the officers said. In other instances, the officers related, the odor from the open sores was unbearable. Other grading camps will be investigated.

According to the officers, the large metal wheelers employed in the grading of streets and other property are too heavy, when loaded with dirt for the mules to pull without serious injury and numerous sores. The friction caused by the harness rubbing on the flesh of the mules, it is thought, resulted in large sores; and the continuous grind kept the sores in an unhealed condition. The officers stated that in a number of other camps investigated the mules were in good condition.

Damage Claims For Maddog Bites

Claims for damages were filed against the county Monday by O. J. Stone, Matt Chapman, Jonas James, Walter Sapp and Mrs. J. O. Mounce for alleged injury and expense they have suffered by reason of being bitten by a maddog. The claims range from \$30.00 to \$150.00. The dog is owned by a Rockingham county man, it was stated. All of the parties reside in the section east of Walnut Cove.

The county commissioners appointed a jury, composed of W. W. Fulp, Calvin Flinn and J. L. Murray, to investigate the matter and report the facts to the board at the next meeting.—Danbury Reporter.
