Talks With the County Agent

The poultry meeting which was scheduled for last Friday night was held at the town hall at Mount Airy. The Mount Airy Poultry club, a community organization was formed and the next meeting will be held, next Thursday night, 7.30 P. M. at the town hall. It is urged by the members who were present at the first meeting to bring out as many people as possible who are interested in the improvement and development of the poultry industry in this community.

The following officers were elected; president, D. O. Sunderland, vice-president W. H. Holcomb, Secretary Jim Midkiff. The following are the members; E. G. Badgett, City T. F. Beamer, Mt. Airy, R. S., C. F. Poore, City, C. F. Hennis, City, Warren Hollingsworth, City, Ora Roberts, City, J. B. Midkiff, City, H. Burton, Mt. Airy R. 2, John Simpson, Route 4, Vance Cave, Dobson, James Thompson, R. 4, Charlie Simpson, R. 4, Lewis Burton, R. 3, Roy Bolton, City. Several poultry growers who could not be present have expressed a desire to become members.

Some of the following topics are expected to be discussed at the meetings this winter—standardization of breeds, poultry houses, accredited hatchery and hatchery flocks to prevent white diarrhoea, poultry diseases, feeding and feeding rations, cold storage eggs, short poultry courses, and many other things which are vitally connected with the poultry industry.

Short courses for busy farmers and women will be held at State College beginning early next year. Poultry Production will start January 18, 19, 20, 21, 22, 23, Bookkeeping January 19, 20, 21, Soils and Fertilizers, February 9, 10, 11. Information about the short courses can be secured by writing to Director of Instructions, School of Agriculture, State College, Station, Raleigh, N. C. These courses are free. Meals 25c at the dining hall and rooms will be secured in private families nearby for those in attendance. Ladies as well as men attend these courses. Then there are winter term courses starting Wednesday, January 6 and ends Tuesday, March 16. These are worthwhile courses and I would like to see many people avail themselves of the excellent advantages offered by our State College. All the courses given are intensely practical.

There are in the office of the County Agent blueprints of excellent commercial houses. These will be furnished to any one free of charge who is going to build a poultry house.
