Talks With the County Agent

It seems to me that dairying offers good opportunities to the people of Surry county and the state of North Carolina if you are willing to work and make a study of the proposition and keep everlastingly after it. However do not get the idea that you can run a dairy without work and studying the underlying principles of the business but if well handled you can rest assured that it will pay good dividends. For some time there has been considerable talk about the importation of butter from foreign countries, particularly from the rapidly expanding dairy countries south of the equator. Early in November a shipment of New Zealand butter reached San Francisco and it is now reported that several thousands boxes are afloat from Argentina to New York. Considerable of the New Zealand butter was put in storage pending favorable price developments. The Argentine shipment came in consignment. There does not seem to be much possibility of so very much of importation on account of high tariff and shipping rates and high prices prevailing in other countries. Probably for a long time outside competition will not seriously disturb the dairy business of this country. So let us give more consideration to this industry.

The poultry and egg situation has been rather interesting during the past month. A scarcity of fancy brown eggs has caused them to advance rapidly the past month and to sell at higher prices than white eggs. The low point in receipts and the high point in prices have apparently been reached or passed but cold and snowy weather would doubtless cause a firmer situation and might result in temporarily higher prices.

The market on both live and dressed poultry has been active as usual around Thanksgiving. Turkeys, ducks, and geese have been the greatest demand at higher prices than last year.

On December 15 we held a farmers' meeting at Rockford, several matters of interest came up for discussion, among them commercial canning, proper tobacco fertilizers, rotation of crops, and poultry, which was the chief subject discussed. Many of the farmers took part in the discussion.

On December 16 a poultry meeting was held at Flat Branch school house. Besides talks made by the County Agent and farmers, Messrs. J. B. Sparger and G. C. Lovill, of Mount Airy took part in the discussion, and plans were laid to make a serious effort to develop this industry in Bryantownship.

On December 17 another meeting was held at Mount Airy by the Mount Airy Community Poultry Club. Some of the things were discussed marketing, purchasing of supplies, test and inspection of birds. The next meeting which will be the third of this club will be held at the town hall, December 30, at 7:30 P. M. The County Agent has left with the president of the club, Mr. D. O. Sunderland blue prints of commercial houses and brooders. Mr. Sunderland will be glad to show these to any one interested in building poultry houses and brooders or you can examine copies in the office of the County Agent at Dobson. Of course there are no charges for this.

On December 18, I made a thirty minute talk to the debating society at Oak Grove school house. Plans were outlined for the coming year of how the work would be conducted this year. From the talk to a mixed crowd two men asked for terracing demonstrations and others asked for information. The president of the debating society asked that a general farmers meeting to be held as soon as possible to discuss matters of interest to farmers, many indicated that they desired such a meeting which will be held at Oak Grove school house, December 31 which will be Thursday night at 6:30 P. M. All are invited to come and take part in the discussion under the leadership of the County Agent.

There are two interesting incidents well worth reporting about the interest in poultry among the young people. In one rural school after the visit of the County Agent some boys were absent. This of course caused the teacher to investigate and led to the discovery that the boys were at home preparing to go into the poultry business and in the other case the boys came to my office and examined rather closely the blue prints of poultry houses kept in the office. One of the boys said that he was going to build a house like the blue prints. While I do not advocate nor approve of such for it is very important for them to go to school yet I am glad

that they are taking it seriously and I think some of our adult poultrymen will have to hustle to keep ahead.

On December 25, Mr. R. W. G. Warner, Extension Forester will be in this county to examine a number of farm wood lots. We hope to get all those who are interested in profitable wood lots started out along a definite line. If there are others who are interested please notify me and we will be glad to pay you a visit. We are planning some work around Pilot Mountain.

The ceremonies and other arrangements are in the hands of Engineer W. W. (Bud) Smith, exalted cyclops of Spencer and also great titan of Province No. 2, who is giving special attention to plans for the big event, which is expected to eclipse anything ever witnessed in Spencer.

To Erect New Cotton Mill at Kannapolis

Concord, Dec. 11.—Officials announced today that the Cannon Manufacturing Company will erect a new mill at Kannapolis that will house 50,000 spindles. Cost and plans were not given out, but a conservative estimate placed the cost at \$2,000,000. The mill will be built north of the present plant No. 6, on the Concord-Salisbury highway, and will employ about 1,000 persons.

It is understood also that formative plans are before the company contemplating an electric power plant for the entire group of mills at Kannapolis.

The new mill will be in Cabarrus County, and will be a part of the present plant of the company, which is the largest towel mill in the world.

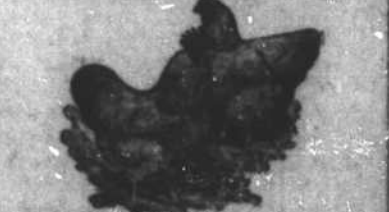
