Wolf Found Fast Killing Chickens

North Wilkesboro, Jan. 25.—The fur of a real Northwestern Canadian wolf was brought into North Wilkesboro last week by Mr. Nelson Andrews, of Boomer township, Wilkes county. Mr. Andrews heard something disturbing his chickens and when he investigated he found a large gray animal rapidly devouring the fowls. He brought the animal down at the first shot and the people of the community decided that the animal was a cross between a gray fox and some large species of animal.

When the fur was brought here for sale, however, Carl A. Lowe, one of the south's largest buyers, identified it as being the fur of one of the larger species of man-eating wolves of Northwestern Canada. These wolves are dangerous only when they travel in large packs where food is very scarce.

The wolf measured five feet in length and weighed nearly thirty pounds. It is believed here that this is the only wolf of this kind to be killed in Wilkes county. Hunters have often seen the animal in the Boomer section, but were unable to capture or kill it.

Citizens of the Boomer community say that they believe there are other wolves near there in the foothills of the Brushy mountains.

Leominster, Mass., Feb. 4.—A policeman today stood guard at the desk of Dr. Charles E. Gigelow, widely known in this section for his charity. The guard was placed because of the discovery that the desk contained \$3,000 in cash and undeposited checks.
