R. E. REEVES DIES IN NEW YORK

Distinguished Son of Surry Now Sleeps With His Fathers—Special Car Brought Funeral Party Here

The remains of Richard Early Reeves, of Summit, N. J., president of the Hunter Manufacturing & Commission Company of New York City, who died in the Vanderbilt hospital, New York, Saturday afternoon, were brought here Tuesday for interment in the family plot in Oakdale cemetery.

Mr. Reeves was the eldest son of Mr. and Mrs. Mike Reeves, deceased, of this county and was born on the Reeves farm near this city, he attended the Mount Airy High school and completed his education in the Oak Ridge Institute, where he graduated at the age of 21 years.

The death of Mr. Reeves came as a shock to his friends both in this state and in New York city. He had enjoyed good health until about three weeks ago when he contracted pneumonia which was followed by complications of sinus disorders. Last week he was to have attended a stockholders meeting of the company in Greensboro but the meeting was postponed on account of his illness.

Mr. Reeves is survived by his widow who was formerly Miss Susan Graham, daughter of C. E. Graham, of Greenville, S. C.; two sons, R. E. Jr. aged 16 and C. E. aged 13, one daughter, Miss Susan Reeves, aged 10 years, five brothers, Mr. R. and John, and Charles of Sanford, and Dr. J. B. Reeves, D. D. of Fulton, Mo., and one sister, Mrs. Marshall Wyatt, wife of Rev. Marshall Wyatt, of Chester, Va.

A funeral service was held for Mr. Reeves in the First Methodist Church in Summit, N. J. Monday afternoon and the body was brought to this city by rail, a special car being provided for the remains and the funeral party which was attached to the train reached here Tuesday noon, they were joined in Greensboro by relatives from various points while others awaited them here.

The large procession formed at the depot and proceeded at once to Oakdale cemetery where the interment took place. Accompanying the remains were his brother Mr. Charles

Reeves, of Sanford, R. G. Vaughn and C. W. Causey, of Greensboro, who reached New Jersey in time for the funeral his pastor Rev. Henry Lambdin, D. D. of Summit, N. J., his family and a few close friends, and Rev. T. W. Sloan, D. D. of the First Presbyterian Church, Greenville, S. C., former pastor of Mrs. Reeves who officiated at their marriage. Among the other relatives attending the funeral and accompanying them as far as Greensboro on the return trip were Mr. and Mrs. Marvin Reeves, Mrs. Mrs. Charles Reeves and son of Sanford, Mr. and Mrs. John L. Davis of Greensboro.

Soon after his graduation Mr. Reeves became associated with the Hunter Manufacturing and Commission Co. at that time a small selling organization for southern cotton mills with headquarters in Greensboro.

His rise in the textile business was rapid and soon after joining the Hunter company he was sent to New York as a representative.

Due largely to Mr. Reeves' ability the concern grew to be the largest textile selling organization in the country. The company now handles the entire output of over 70 southern mills and is one of the most important factors in the industry. It now sells over 20 per cent of the cotton piece goods and more than 50 per cent of the cotton and silk mixed fabrics made in the south and does an annual business of more than \$100,000,000.

For the last 10 years Mr. Reeves had made his home in Summit, N. J., and was prominently connected with the First Methodist Church of that city. He took a great interest in young men and conducted a Bible class in his church. He always found time to aid his friends and often helped the most humble employee in his organization.

Upon learning of the death of Mr. Reeves, R. G. Vaughn made the following statement: "In the passing of Richard Early Reeves, the textile industry has lost one of its greatest men. He was well versed in industrial and manufacturing affairs and did much to further the upbuilding of the south. While living in the north, he was a true Southerner and always had the welfare of this section first in his mind. His rise in the Hunter organization was due to his ability combined with hard work. The entire textile industry will be affected by his untimely death."

Mrs. Robert F. Jones Dead

The funeral of Mrs. Nancy Emily Jones, widow of the late Robert F. Jones was conducted from the Salem Methodist Church Monday afternoon and her remains laid to rest in the church cemetery, the pastor, Rev. W. J. S. Walker being assisted in the service by Rev. D. V. Price and Rev. G. W. Williams.

She was the daughter of John and Nancy Gwyn and was married to Mr. Robert F. Jones in 1856. She was the mother of nine children, three girls and six boys. Her husband and two daughters preceded her to the grave. Besides her surviving children she leaves 34 grandchildren and 13 great-grandchildren.

She was a good neighbor and a kind and loving wife and mother, living a devoted christian life she leaves an example worthy of emulation.
