THOUSANDS HEAR PASTOR PREACH AFTER TRAGEDY

Dr. Norris Delivers Sermon to Tremendous Audience. Choir Of Seven Hundred.

Ft. Worth, Tex., July 18.—Charged with murder for the killing yesterday of D. E. Chipps, Fort Worth lumberman, the Rev. J. Frank Norris today preached his regular Sunday morning sermon from the text "There is no condemnation to them that are in Christ Jesus."

Standing within fifty feet of the church study where Chipps was killed when he called to protest against certain utterances of the widely-known Baptist pastor, Dr. Norris told one of the largest Sunday audiences he ever has commanded that his faith was stronger than ever.

The large First Baptist Church auditorium which seats six thousand, was filled to the doors with many standing and several hundred outside. Before Dr. Norris started preaching a choir of 700 voices sang hymn after hymn while two pianos with relays of pianists, furnished the music.

Moments of Emotion.

When Dr. Norris finished speaking several hundred of his congregation sauntered down to the front of the church to shake the preacher's hand as he stood before the platform. Many embraced him and at this point Dr. Norris showed the only sign that the tragedy had affected him. He neither smiled nor nodded, but appeared to be on the verge of tears, and seemed unable to speak because of emotion. While this service was in progress, Chipps' friends prepared for the latter's funeral this afternoon.

According to the preacher's version of the shooting, given last night, Chipps called at Dr. Norris' study and threatened to kill him. He demanded the pastor's statement said, that the latter desist from attacks on certain of Chipps' friends. Dr. Norris had launched an attack on Mayor H. C. Meacham for the purchase by the city of and for the opening of a street. In his church publication, The Searchlight, and in sermons, he is said to have charged that the street opening was designed to benefit Meacham's own property. He is owner of a large department store.

Version of Tragedy.

Dr. Norris says he tried to induce Chipps to leave his study and he escorted the visitor to the door. The latter, however, returned with a threat and apparently was about to attack him when Dr. Norris said he took a watchman's pistol from a drawer and fired at Chipps.

Chipps was shot three times, dying in an ambulance.

The morning sermon was briefer than usual because of the communion service that followed. After communion, Dr. Norris made a declaration of unshaken faith, asked the prayers of the congregation and asserted that "this day begins a new day."

When he called for converts, two men and three women responded.

Dr. Norris said that this was "a little unusual."

Norris first attracted nationwide attention when the church of which he was pastor burned in March 1911, under mysterious circumstances which led to his trial on a charge of arson. After a trial in which many startling climaxes developed, including testimonies of a government meteorologist regarding the position of the moon at the time of the blaze, Norris was acquitted.

Growing Congregation.

Norris' congregation, which has followed him through the ups and downs of his career, has been increasing each year. It was only a few days ago that he announced opening of a radio membership for all unable to attend his services in person.

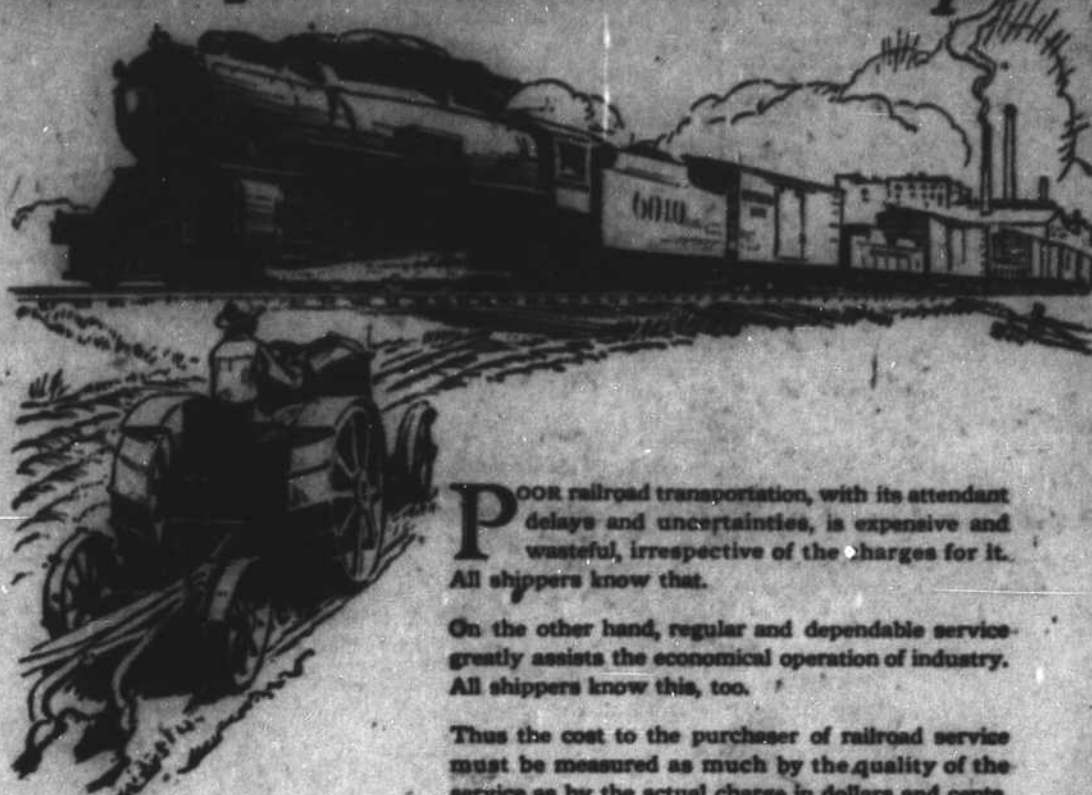
