HAS NO KICK AGAINST TREATMENT IN PRISON

L. D. Royal, Holly Springs Ex-Convict, Recently Paroled, Praises Management.
Raleigh, July 7.—L. D. Royal, Holly Springs prisoner who has just been released from the state's prison on an indeterminate sentence of 45 to 60 months, is offering considerable opposition to prisoners who have been attacking the prison management after their discharge.
The institution was recently visited by discharged time-servers who declared that they had not been personally mistreated, but had watched other who received little consideration. Young Royal, who is a handsome young fellow, says that he cannot see how the state could treat its men better and he points to his huge physique as exhibit 'A' in array of good food prepared for the prisoners. He denies that men have been sent to dark cells on bread and water for long periods.

The Holly Springs man was sent to the prison by Judge Henry A. Grady, who was moved, he says in a letter to the prisoner, more by a desire to cure the young fellow of the drug habit than by any conviction that he needed a long term for punishment. Royal was sent up on charges of false pretense. It is Judge Grady's belief that the drug habit was back of his downfall.

The former prisoner came proudly up to Pardon Commissioner Hoyle Sink's office today and presented the letter written him by Judge Grady after the parole was granted. The boy, who has a family of wife and five children, is strong for the courts and confinement. A portion of Judge Grady's letter reads: "I believe all of your troubles have come, not from an evil nature, but from bad associates, bad liquor, and the influence of some miserable skunk of a doctor in Durham, who started you in the drug habit. I may be wrong; but that is my opinion. I did not send you to the penitentiary for punishment; but for a cure, if possible of your drug habit. The prison physicians say you are cured. May the good Lord keep you in that condition. I know it is hard to quit; I have seen hundreds of drug addicts who couldn't be cured. It is a terrible condition to get in; and it required nerve and backbone to come back and be a man."

"You have a great many friends who will lend you a helping hand; you also have a few fool advisers who will do you no good. The best adviser of all is your wife, who has stood by you in all your troubles."

"It is so easy to do the right thing that I cannot understand why men go wrong. There are only two things in this world that are really worth while, and they are common sense and character. If a man has both of these he will succeed. If he is lacking in either, he may shine for a while; but he will fall soon or late."

Judge Grady was an intimate friend of the prisoner's family, who live in Sampson, but he stood against them in their plea for discharge without a prison sentence. "I refused their pleas in your behalf until I felt that you were ready and able to stand the pressure on the outside," he says, "and then I acted."

Interesting Farm News From Pilot Route 2.

Pilot Mountain, Route 2, July 19.—The wheat crop in this section has been thrashed, some good yields are reported.
Arthur Cook had twenty-three acres sown that produced 502 bushels. Mr. Cook's yield ran as high as 75 bushels per acre.
U. G. Matthews had twenty-five acres that produced 648 bushels. C. C. Arrington seven acres that produced 128 bushels, many of our farmers thrashed out from 100 to 200 bushels this year.

J. A. Tilley, C. C. Arrington and others are busy building poultry houses at present.
If you would like to know just what Japan clover will do, look over J. A. Chilton's corn crop. He sowed some very poor soil in Japan clover two years ago. Last winter he turned the soil under and planted corn this year. He will get a yield of 50 bushels per acre.

There is an epidemic among the chickens in this community that is killing a number of them.
There is the best tobacco and corn crop in the Cook's School section that has been for several years.
There will be preaching and Sunday School at Pine Ridge Church next Sunday. There is expected a very large crowd on this date, since it will be the beginning of a non-denominational Sunday School.
