**Patronize Your Home Merchant.**

Mr. Customer: Farmer, tradesman, artisan, member of a profession—the upbuilding of your town or village, the business center around your home, is a matter of vital importance to you. If your town grows, you prosper—if it stagnates or goes backward, you lose.

Throughout the North and the Middle West there are vast areas in which real estate, both in the cities and the country, is held at inflated values because the towns and villages have been in a state of stagnation for a quarter of a century. This is due largely to the fact that the people have spent their money with the mail order houses instead of patronizing their home merchants. One Illinois city has not increased in population in the last 25 years. During this same period the records show that its trade territory has sent annually \$4,000,000 to the Chicago mail order houses. Had this \$100,000,000 been spent with the local merchants this city would have more than quadrupled in size. Real estate, which has been at the lowest valuation in comparison with other cities of its size for the past 20 years, would have from 10 to 100 times its present value. Farms, which today can be bought at \$150 an acre, would be in the city limits and, cut up in lots, would bring from \$40 to \$75 a front foot.

It is the profit dollars that build your town. If your profit dollar goes to the mail order house, you are building Chicago, New York or some other metropolis. The dollar you spend with your home merchant stays in your community, helps build it up and eventually comes back to you. The dollar you send away, never returns. Every dollar spent with the mail order houses reduces the valuation of your farm or city real estate just that much, plus compound interest.

If you will take the trouble to investigate, you will find that your local dealer saves you money. For the same quality, you pay as much or more to the mail order house. If you want "cheap" merchandise, your home merchant will get it for you, for he is in business to stay. His reputation for honest dealing and honest values is his first consideration. He stands behind your purchase. If you are not satisfied, he makes it right.

However, you are doing yourself the greatest favor by trading with your home merchant.

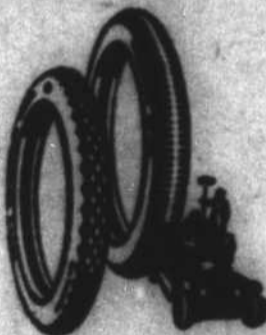
