To Jail For Allowing Wife to Die Without Dr.

Springfield, La., Oct. 5.—Found guilty of allowing his wife to die without receiving medical attention, Dave White was sentenced by Judge C. Reid in circuit court here Monday to serve from five to seven years in the state penitentiary. He was also fined \$1 and costs.

White was granted an appeal to the state supreme court and released on bond of \$1,500.

Revealing that he had searched legal records for four months, Judge Reid expressed the belief that the case is without parallel in this country.

Mrs. White died almost a year ago after giving birth to twins. It was charged during the trial that White did not provide medical attention for his wife because of his religious beliefs.
