

and Fourth Commandment. In the Fourth Commandment as being in "six days shall thou labor" the inhibition to labor on the seventh? Teachers, who do not believe in idleness or in Sabbath desecration, have been in the habit of treating both as of equal importance. Is that right?

The recent action of Henry Ford in changing a five-day working week to a six-day one has raised the question whether he was flying in the face of the Fourth Commandment which reads:

Remember the Sabbath day to keep holy. Six days thou labor and do

all thy work; but the seventh day is the Sabbath of Lord thy God; in it thou shalt not do any work, thou, nor thy son, nor thy daughter, nor thy manservant, nor thy maidservant, nor thy ox, nor thy ass, nor any of thy beasts, nor any of thy cattle, nor any of thy fowls, nor any of thy beasts that are within thy gates; for in six days the Lord made heaven and earth, the sea, and all that is therein, and rested on the seventh day, wherefore the Lord blessed the Sabbath day, and hallowed it.

Mr. Ford and theologians who approve the five-day working week will probably say that THE impossible command is "thou shalt labor and do all thy work," and that the "six days" was the measure of time required in periods when there were no labor-

ing facilities or quick transportation. Undoubtedly a man can do more work in five days now than he could accomplish in six days when he rode or on an cart or walked on foot paths, and when there were no labor-saving devices.

In the Ford plan a violation of the Fourth Commandment?—News and Observer.

The World's Most Richly Endowed School in Duke

With an endowment which ultimately is to reach the gigantic sum of from \$20,000,000 to \$100,000,000, the Duke University, of Durham, N. C. is now building a plant which will involve the construction of sixty buildings at a cost of about \$25,000,000. It is estimated to complete this gigantic construction program. The work now under way is costing about \$200,000 monthly. Included in the undertaking will be a medical and hospital group costing about \$4,000,000, with an endowment of \$5,000,000. The site of the university is on a tract of land covering 1,500 acres, which is connected with a 4,000-acre tract with riparian rights owned by the university on both sides of the New Hope river. The original endowment by Mr. Duke of \$45,000,000 is to be increased by adding aside a portion of the income until the endowment has reached \$20,000,000, but it is estimated that in the course of time the endowment will aggregate at least \$100,000,000 and possibly continue with an almost indefinite expansion.

The proposition is one of such tremendous magnitude that it is diff-

icult to visualize what this institution will mean to the educational work, not alone of the south but of the entire country. It might not be inappropriate to suggest in the trustees of this university that they establish in connection with its work a school of technology and research equal in facilities to the greatest technological school in America. It would be difficult to exaggerate the importance of such a school of technology thus richly endowed and giving to the students of the south opportunities equal to anything to be found anywhere in technical work, even if not by virtue of the situation and opportunity surpassing any other institution of the kind in this country or in Europe. It is true that plans already made include civil and electrical engineering schools, but to this might be added metallurgical schools, textile schools and other technical schools of the widest possible influence, in order that there may be created in the central south a center of technical education for graduate and post-graduate work unsurpassed anywhere.

With this vast endowment the trustees of the Duke University have an opportunity never vouchsafed to any other similar body of men in America. Their responsibility is in keeping with the opportunity.

BODY OF HER HUSBAND FOR WITNESS

Embalsmed Body Of Murdered Husband To Be a Silent Witness At Trial

Toledo, Ohio, Oct. 16.—The embalsmed body of a murdered man will be taken into the courtroom as a silent witness in a trial to take place here within a few weeks, provided legal action by the defense does not restrain County Attorney Byron Kirpatrick from carrying out his strange plan.

"There is too great a tendency on the part of a jury in a murder trial to overlook the fact that someone has been killed," declares the county attorney in explanation of his idea. "Any reference to the dead man is met with prompt objection by the defense counsel on the ground it is prejudicial."

"This time I am going to produce the dead man himself. It will establish beyond doubt that the man is dead, a contention that the state, somehow, often finds difficult in getting to the jury."

Opposition to Kirpatrick's plan,

which is without precedent in the criminal annals of the state, probably will center about the competency of such evidence. An effort by the defense to force burial before the trial also will be made, it is understood.
