**Methodists Have Good Year—Some Appointments.**

The 37th session of the Western North Carolina Conference M. E. Church, South, which was held at Gastonia came to a close with the reading of the appointments Sunday afternoon. The grand total raised for all purposes during the year by this conference was \$2,410,000. Six educational institutions in the conference employ 101 teachers and have a property valuation of \$1,781,250 and an endowment of \$15,500,000 with an indebtedness of only \$66,000.

The Children's Home in Winston-Salem has 30 teachers and 200 children and the property is valued at a million dollars.


**How Do You Treat Company?**
