SOUR CREAM DISHES

sour cream, two cupfuls of thick sour cream, two cupfuls of hrown sugar, one cupful of chopped raisina, two-thirds of a cupful of butter, two well-heaten eggs, one tenspoonful each of cinnamon, cloves and nutmeg, with flour to make a dough as stiff as can be stirred. Drop by tenspoonfuls on a well-greased pan, leaving plenty of room to spread. A raisin or nut may be added to each to garnish.

Guick Cream Cookies.—To one cup-ful of sour cream add one cupful of sugar, one egg, two and one-half cup-fuls of flour, one teaspoonful of soda, with sait and flavoring to taste. Drop by spoonfuls on wall-greased pans, pat out and sprinkle with sugar, add-ing a put or a raisin. Bake in a quick over. quick oven.

Sweet Petato Pie .- Take a cupful of sour cream, one cupful of sugar, one plnt of mashed sweet potato, the yolks of four eggs, one tenspoonful of cinnamon, one-half a nutmeg; salt all well mixed together. Bake in one crust and spread with strained hones while hot,

Graham Muffins. Take one cupful sour cream, one cupful of graham flour, one tenspoonful of sodn and one tablespoonful of sugar, a beaten egg. all well mixed. Bake in buttered gem


