**Automobile Deaths In Last Two Years Exceed Number of World War Victims.**

New York, Dec. 12.—Deaths in the United States this year probably will exceed by 75,000 the total number in 1918 and 1919, according to a report made today by Henry S. Hollis, president of the Equitable Life Insurance company of Iowa, said in an address today before the convention of the association of life insurance presidents.

More Americans were killed by automobiles during the past two years than in the world war, he asserted, estimating that the total number of death victims in automobile accidents would exceed 22,000 this year. Suicides increased 10 per cent during the year. While deaths by murder dropped 7 per cent, figures so far indicate, he said.

This year's increase in the death rate, Mr. Hollis pointed out, should not be taken as indicating such a trend from recent years, as the mortality rate during the period of the past six years alone has decreased more than 9 per cent.

Of the expected increase of 75,000 in the number of deaths this year, Mr. Hollis said that 22,000 could be explained by normal growth of the country's population, while 53,000 deaths would result from the higher mortality rate for 1926.
