SURRY COUNTY FARM AND POULTRY NEWS

By E. E. White, Surry County Farm Demonstration Agent

During the next few weeks while it is cold and disagreeable we should make out definite plans for farm operations for next year. We should make plans so that our farm work is well distributed over the entire year and that our cash income will be evenly distributed as well. On a one crop basis as we are now working the money comes in at one time and when that is spent then we are dependent on credit for the rest of the year. Credit is a good thing but this can be abused as well as anything else. If you have a cash income for every month you will find that credit will not be hard to get besides you will find that you can get along nicely without so much. Of course you will naturally expect some suggestion to be made as to the development of additional cash income. Many can be suggested but here are three that we can develop on our own conditions in this county. Here they are: poultry, dairying and fruit growing. We are expecting to do work on other lines but the three mentioned will receive serious consideration in the next few months.

On the 19th and 20th of this month we are going to have a Fruit Growers Conference at Mount Airy. We believe every fruit grower and every potential fruit grower should be present and take part in the program. A small profitable orchard can be developed on practically every farm in this county. Small orchards rightly handled will pay a good profit every year in furnishing good fruit for the family besides the market which has been developed the last few years by trucks.

In next week's paper we will furnish a complete program of the activities for the two days. We will have the following with us: Prof. Newman, of the Progressive Farmer, H. R. Niswonger, Horticulture Specialist, C. D. Matthews, Chairman of the Division of Horticulture, N. C. State College, E. B. Morrow, Horticulture Specialist of eastern Carolina and C. H. Brannon, Insect Specialist, N. C. State College. We are expecting to make this a very worth while undertaking for the fruit industry of the county. We want every one to be present so we can make this a very profitable conference. This is the first time that we have had such in Surry County and we want to make this a success for the State is furnishing us the very best specialists that can be gotten in order to give us the benefit of the very best information which is obtainable. This does not cost the fruit growers of Surry County and extra money. Be sure and keep this meeting in mind and tell your neighbors.

I am always glad for farmers to furnish interesting items about interesting things in their neighborhood. Of course we want items about some good farm practice which is being carried on in a successful way. Such is good news besides it encourages others to do likewise. Oftentimes we know of some good farmer who is doing a splendid piece of work on some new line and he thinks because he is well acquainted with this practice that all farmers know about it. Such is not the case and if such is published some other farmer will be benefitted by doing likewise.

To give you an illustration here is a good bit of farm news. Curran Smith, State Road, N. C., has a registered O. I. C. sow that has dropped four litters of pigs with the following numbers at a litter; 17, 19, 20 and 21. This is a remarkably prolific sow and if any of you farmers can use this sow at \$150 there should be no trouble in producing ton litter pigs. Mr. Smith is one of the most progressive and hard working farmers in the county. He is successful in developing an orchard and he does most of the work himself with a little additional hiring. Can anyone beat this record for pigs?

This is an age for antiques hunting and many things are being sold simply because it is old. State College is starting a Museum for old farm implements which they hope will be representative of the development of farm implements in this state. Doubtless there are many farm implements which were used in the past and perhaps long before the Civil War which can be gotten in shape so it will bear out the history of agricultural development of this state. Such antiques do not have any money value for no one seems to have any ambition to make such a collection yet the State College is anxious to get such a collection and is willing to go to the trouble of making such a collection. Death Rate From Autos In N. C. Is One To 320

Washington, Dec. 26.—One automobile fatality to every 320 automobiles is the record of North Carolina for 1926, according to a statement just issued by the committee of traffic accident statistics of the national conference on street and highway safety.

The statement shows that there were 410 deaths in North Carolina in 1926 as a result of automobile accidents, and there were 340,587 automobiles registered. Consequently the deaths per 100,000 automobiles registered in the state was 120, the eleventh highest rate in the entire country.

New York state ranked first not only in the number of automobiles registered in 1926, but also in the number of deaths from automobile accidents. In New York one person was killed for every 721 automobiles registered. Florida ranked first, however, in the proportion of fatalities, compared with the number of automobiles registered. In Iowa there were fewer deaths, compared with the number of cars owned, than in any other state, there having been in 1926 only one death to every 2,190 cars registered.

The number of cars registered the report states, cannot be taken as a true index to the volume of automobile traffic. A state might have a comparatively small number of automobiles registered, and still rank high in the number of miles traveled by automobiles, the number of miles traveled per car, the number of miles traveled by cars registered in other states, etc.

Other factors must be considered before reaching any conclusions based in the figures presented. On the other hand, it is stated, the increasing number of cars registered should not lead to the belief that the number of deaths from automobile accidents must continue to increase. Nor should the increase in the automobile fatalities be excused on the ground that the number of automobiles, and therefore the risk, has grown.

Emphasis, the report declares should be constantly given to the fact that the death rate from automobile accidents is increasing rapidly year after year, and that the street hazard for every one is becoming greater and greater. Better regulations must be enacted and enforced and better safety campaigns must be carried on. Were the number of automobiles constant year after year, it would be easier to gauge the efforts of the various remedial measures already attempted. But the number of automobiles is increasing so rapidly as to present a tremendous problem in itself, a problem which necessarily calls for drastic safety measures.

The fact, according to the 1926 figures, for each auto fatality in Iowa, there were 2,190 automobile registrations, while in Florida for each fatality there were only 597 such registrations, indicates the much more serious effect of the increasing number of automobiles in one state than in another.
