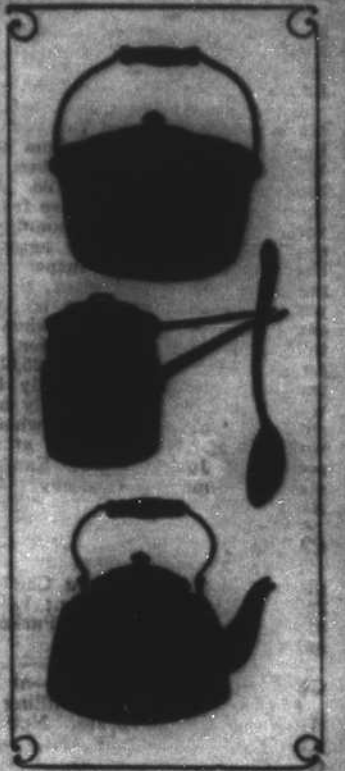

### SUSTAINING FOOD

Fletcher tells us that half the ill flesh is heir to are caused by improper mastication of food and the overindulgence in rich foods.

Statistics recently published on cancer state that the large proportion of sufferers from this dread disease are among the rich and well nourished. Even ten pounds of overweight is a menace to health. A decrease of a pound or two a week is a most simple matter. Cut down on the fats and sweets. Eat everything you like but stop eating after a reasonable amount has been taken.

Again, Fletcher says, if we cut down our food, one-third, we would be well nourished, live longer and feel better. It is such an important habit to form early, the one of well masticating the food. Begin with the two-year-old and the problem will be settled forever for that child.

Plenty of roughage, greens, beans, vegetables with a good deal of cellulose or woody fiber is needed to keep the bodily functions active. Fresh onions and lettuce should be a daily diet in any growing family; lettuce is rich in vitamins that promote growth. Grated carrots added to any fresh lettuce salad, or served with a few chopped nuts and a bit of finely cut apple and a good dressing is a good one to serve often, especially when cooked carrots are refused.

A slice or two of crisp well-cooked bacon, a half-inch slice of toast, buttered with a generous amount of butter, an egg and a cup of coffee with a tablespoonful of thick cream, will make a good breakfast, if slowly masticated. A doughnut may be added for the thin person but is not necessary.

Going without a meal seems to be a good method for some people, but it is not wise to cut down on the food too rapidly at first, let the body adjust itself gradually to the change. In a few weeks the normal weight will be reached.

Add a teaspoonful of peanut butter to French dressing, smoothing it into the oil before adding the lemon juice or vinegar; it adds greatly to the flavor, if one likes peanuts.

### ONLY ONE SENATOR IN BACHELOR CLASS

All Members of State's Upper House Married Except Senator Salmon, of Lillington.

Raleigh, Jan. 6.—Of the 50 senators in the present session of the legislature, only one man is still single. Forty-nine have made their choices for life partners but Senator Neill McK. Salmon, of Lillington, Harnett county, has so far been able to remain single. His aims along matrimonial lines have not yet been broadcast to the state but, with only one single man in the upper branch, to spoil an otherwise perfect record, fellow senators are hopeful for him also.

Senator Salmon is, by the way, the third youngest man in the senate. He is 29. He is outdistanced in youth by Senator R. L. Whitmore, of Hendersonville, who is the baby of that body and is 27 years of age. Second in standing comes Senator Frank L. Grier, of Stateville, who is just 28 years old.

It was difficult work to find out who the youngest members were but to discover who would walk off with honors of old age in another matter. None has been found as yet to claim that distinction.

### Durham Tackles Desertion Problem.

Durham, Jan. 8.—Desertions of both husbands and wives, with the resultant abandonment or partial abandonment of children has developed into one of the most important problems of domestic relationship in Durham, the report of the superintendent of public welfare shows in his report for 1926.

During the year 178 cases of desertion have come to the attention of the welfare department, officers believing that this is by no means the complete number of separations. These family upheavals have been responsible for most of the 1,991 dependent, neglected and delinquent children that have been handled by the department and the juvenile court officers report.

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### Youth Meets Shocking Fate.

Franklinton, Jan. 8.—Paul Gallaher, 16 years old, son of William Gallaher, lost his life at a saw mill located on Lynch's creek about six miles northwest of Loula, Wednesday morning about 9:30 o'clock. From the reports received in Loula, it seems that young Gallaher was assisting his father, who is the sawyer at the mill, with a log on the carriage when his glove and a leg of his overalls got caught on the dog of the carriage. Not being able to stop the machine or to get loose the boy was carried on to the circular saw when his head was cut open, his shoulder and arm cut loose and his leg cut off. Death was instantaneous.
