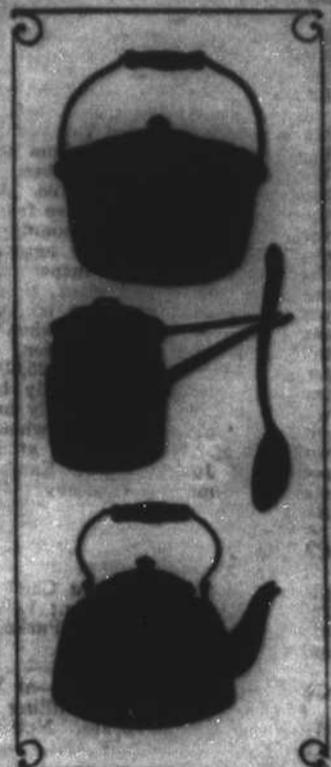

SUSTAINING FOOD

Fletcher tells us that half the ill health is heir to are caused by improper mastication of food and the overindulgence in rich foods.

Statistics recently published on cancer state that the large proportion of sufferers from this dread disease are among the rich and well nourished. Even ten pounds of

overweight is a menace to health. A decrease of a pound or two a week is a most simple matter. Cut down on the fats and sweets. Eat everything you like but stop eating after a reasonable amount has been taken.

Again, Fletcher says, if we cut down our food, one-third, we would be well nourished, live longer and feel better. It is such an important habit to form early, the one of well masticating the food. Begin with the two-year-old and the problem will be settled forever for that child.

Plenty of roughage, greens, beans, vegetables with a good deal of cellulose or woody fiber is needed to keep the bodily functions active. Fresh onions and lettuce should be a daily diet in any growing family; lettuce is rich in vitamins that promote growth.

Grated carrots added to any fresh lettuce salad, or served with a few chopped nuts and a bit of finely cut apple and a good dressing is a good one to serve often, especially when cooked carrots are refused.

A slice or two of crisp well-cooked bacon, a half-inch slice of toast, buttered with a generous amount of butter, an egg and a cup of coffee with a tablespoonful of thick cream, will make a good breakfast, if slowly masticated. A doughnut may be added for the thin person but is not necessary.

Going without a meal seems to be a good method for some people, but it is not wise to cut down on the food too rapidly at first, let the body adjust itself gradually to the change. In a few weeks the normal weight will be reached.

Add a teaspoonful of peanut butter to French dressing, smoothing it into the oil before adding the lemon juice or vinegar; it adds greatly to the flavor, if one likes peanuts.
