**SURRY COUNTY FARM AND POULTRY NEWS**

In the first paragraph of this article I want to take the opportunity of thanking the business men and fruit growers for helping to make the recent Fruit Growers' Conference a success in the county. I have never seen better cooperation shown in putting on the conference. The newspapers of the county furnished space freely while papers outside of the county were as liberal as could be expected. The success and the credit for this undertaking is due to the splendid cooperation of many different groups in the county. We are assured by Prof. C. D. Matthews of State College that another conference can be had next year if the business men and fruit growers will make a request for it. So it is up to us to make the request if we really want the conference. The officials at State College are willing to help us if we will indicate just what we want. It is interesting to note that the peach and apple pruning demonstration at the Granite City Orchard had more in attendance than any other fruit pruning demonstration in the state according to the State College men. The growers were very much interested and this was shown by the number of questions which were asked.

Keep in mind that I will be at Elkin, McNeers' warehouse Friday afternoon, January 28 and at Dobson, Saturday, January 29th, for the purpose of treating tobacco seed with formaldehyde in order to control certain tobacco diseases. Remember the dates and be there to have your seed treated.

Here is the best record so far on quarts of seed distributed by W. E. Merritt Co. Mr. J. P. Venable, Mount Airy, R. 4, secured a quart of Laredo soy beans and planted them. He thrashed out 80 quarts of seed. Can anyone beat this record? If you can let us have the results.

D. O. Sunderland, with Geo. E. Marshall Lumber Co., Mount Airy, has the Schilling Strain S. C. White Leghorns and is offering for sale 15 cockerals and 3 cocks at prices ranging from \$3 to \$25. He has a record of 82 per cent production based on a year. If you are interested in the Schilling Strain it will be worth your while in looking over his flock.

On Thursday night, January 27th, 7 P. M., at the new school building at Little Richmond we will hold a general farmers meeting at which time poultry and related subjects will be discussed. All are invited to come and take part in the meeting.

Samples of clover seed have been furnished the Office of County Agent by the United States Department of Agriculture colored according to the recent legislation of congress. In buying clover seed this year note if it is colored, if it is then you will know it is foreign importation and such is not worth as much as American grown. This coloring is done in order to protect the farmer from inferior seed. Much of our trouble in getting a stand of clover is due to using seed which is unsuitable to our conditions. Of course American grown seed will not guarantee a good stand but will insure much better results than the foreign grown. Another trouble in getting a stand is lack of lime in the soil also fertility. The Federal Seed Act requires that all imported seed of red clovers and alfalfa be colored. Alfalfa seed from Canada will be colored approximately one per cent violet. Imported alfalfa seed formally determined by the Secretary of Agriculture to be unadapted to general use in the United States, will be colored approximately ten per cent red, the same coloring is required for imported alfalfa of unknown origin. Alfalfa seed of known foreign origin, other than Canada, and not formally determined by the Secretary of Agriculture to be unadapted to general use in the United States, will be colored approximately one per cent green, imported red clover seed, formally determined by the Secretary of Agriculture to be unadapted to general use in the United States, will be colored approximately ten per cent red, the same coloring is required for imported red clover seed of unknown origin.  
 Keep this in mind in buying red clover or alfalfa seed for your protection. If you want to see the Department of Agriculture samples come to the office of County Agent at Dobson on the regular office day on Saturday or on first Monday. They

will be gladly shown you so you will be able to determine the place of origin of the seed which is offered you.  
 You should secure reconditioned American grown clover seed sown on well prepared land after danger of frost is over and put on at least one ton of lime, probably one and a half tons would be better and you will find that red clover can be grown in Surry county.

**ACCUSED NEGRO KEPT FROM MOB**

**Rockingham Officers Breathe Easier After Finding Safe Jail For Settles.**

Reidsville, Jan. 22.—Reidsville police officers completely baffled an angry mob estimated at 500 men for the entire night Friday and not until about daylight this morning did the mob abandon its effort to gain custody of Paul Settles, negro, who is being held somewhere for safe-keeping on a charge of criminal assault.  
 The mob began gathering on the principal business street of the city as early as 7:00 o'clock. They first paid a visit to the new jail in the new city hall. Officer John Durham was obliging and told the crowd to search the bastille if they desired. Finding no trace of the negro here they proceeded to the county stockade and then on to Wentworth, where the county jail was searched.  
 Later, it was learned the negro had been removed from Wentworth to Reidsville during the afternoon, but by 5 o'clock the officers had spirited him elsewhere for safe-keeping.

**Girl Auto Driver is Accused of Killing.**

High Point, Jan. 22.—Miss Louise Crowder, 15, a high school student and a daughter of M. J. Crowder of this city, was arrested this morning charged with the killing yesterday afternoon of R. L. Cawley, president of the Towne-Cawley Furniture company, Roanoke, Va. The furniture factory official who was here attending the mid-winter furniture show, was killed by an automobile which was being operated at the time by Miss Crowder.  
 Mr. Crowder, father of the girl, was also arrested charged with allowing his daughter, who is under the driving age, to operate an automobile. Both the daughter and her father have been released under bond. The girl's bond was fixed at \$7,500.
