

SURRY COUNTY FARM AND POULTRY NEWS

On February 7th, 8th and 9th Mr. S. J. Kirby, Permanent Grass Specialist of State College will be in the county to do work on permanent pastures. This is the first time I have been fortunate enough to secure Mr. Kirby's services and we want to make full use of them while he is in the county. Before we can develop much live stock in the county we will have to have plenty of pasturage and roughage during the winter. We can grow good pasturage if we will go at it in the proper way. There are a lot of good grasses and clovers which will give us plenty of feed if we go at it in the right way. Now is a good time to make a start and the sooner started the better off you will be in the next few years. Good permanent pastures cost money to

build but they will return more than they cost in profit and increased soil fertility.

If you are interested in getting permanent pastures let me know and we will make you a visit and study your own conditions and make the necessary recommendation so you get started on the best way of getting permanent pastures. We want to get in touch with all farmers who are interested in getting a good pasture.

In addition to a good pasture as a basis of live stock industry we must have plenty of good hay and one of the easiest for us to grow is plenty of good Laredo soy beans or the Mammoth Yellow and we can grow these without much trouble and will get splendid returns in good hay, fertile soil and profitable live stock, which is so much needed.

Farmers are beginning to ask about the price of soy beans. Various prices are being quoted. A company in South Carolina quotes Laredo at \$4 delivered. Mr. C. P. Creed, Mount Airy, N. C. quotes prices at the car in Mount Airy—Laredos \$2.45 and Mammoth Yellows \$1.70 per bushel. If interested get in touch with Mr. Creed and he will tell you when the car will arrive so you can be there to get the beans. If he has to haul them to his farm he will make an additional charge.

Last year Laredo sold for \$6 per bushel and one bushel will plant 5 acres. This made the cost per acre \$1.20. This year at the present quotation you can get enough seed for 40c. to plant an acre. At this low cost per acre we should not hesitate in planting a large acreage of this variety both for soil building and for feed. It is my ambition to see soy beans on every farm in Surry county. The more beans we grow the better soil we will have and more prosperous farms.

U. V. Burch, Rusk, has recently purchased two pure bred Jerseys. He would like to buy some young calves which is registered. I am always glad to help place some good pure bred on the farms and if you have some let me know so when I have calls for such I will be able to bring buyer and seller together. I have been able to do this several times and if I know what you have for sale or want to buy pure bred registered stock I will be able to help you free of charge.

The question often comes up just how effective Extension Work of the different counties compares with each other. A summary of results of demonstration work in orchard management of apple orchards in Western North Carolina and Upper Piedmont counties in fostering a program on increasing the Production of Marketable Apples. There are eighteen counties in this list and Surry ranks the highest with 69,260 apple trees. The nearest competitor is our neighbor Wilkes county with 55,885 apple trees. Results of Orchard Management in Peach Growing shows Surry with 38,535 peach trees and the nearest competitor with 12,855. These figures represent those following close cooperation with the County Agent and does not include those who are working on an independent basis. This shows that the fruit growers of Surry county are trying to get their orchard management on a definite basis in order to develop a successful and paying proposition. This is a good fruit county and the possibilities of future development are almost unlimited. We can grow a superior fruit but of course this industry would not be developed unless we can market our fruit on a profitable basis. We think that a small well handled orchard on most farms will return a profit under most conditions. Of course we should have plenty of fruit for home use even if

we are not expecting to sell on the market. There seems to be more interest in hog growing than last year. We need a good increase in brood sows as well as milk cows. Many farmers are wondering just where good horses and mules can be secured in the future for such is getting real scarce. In the mule and horse belt they have quit raising colts. Most of our work stock are getting old. Consequently we are going to be facing a serious condition. Of course the mechanical mule may take the place of a real mule but so far it seems to me that we will have to depend on horse and mule labor until some one gets a satisfactory substitute to fit our conditions.
