OFFICERS SHOT IN RAIDING OF STILL

Sheriff Turner, Of Lee, And Chatham Officer in Hospital Badly Wounded.

Sanford, Jan. 30.—Sheriff James L. Turner, of Lee county, and Deputy William Utley were seriously wounded and Deputy Leonard Craig was less seriously wounded by moonshiners this afternoon at a still in the Lick Creek neighborhood seven miles east of Sanford.

Sheriff Turner was shot in the head with buck shot. Utley was shot in the side and Craig in his left arm. The men were taken to the Central Carolina Hospital. Physicians say that Sheriff Turner and Mr. Utley are in serious condition but have a chance to recover.

Blockaders Leave Scene.

Charged with being ring-leaders in the shooting are Bud Davis and a cousin, Tom Davis. They are said to have left the neighborhood of the still in an old model Crow-Elkhart seven-passenger car with the curtain torn from the rear. Officers here were notified that this car passed Apex at a quarter to nine o'clock tonight. Sheriff Turner of Wake county was notified and said he would put out posers at once to seek to intercept the party. Leaving the neighborhood with the Davises were Meekham Harrison, a one eyed man said to be from Raleigh, and Parker Robbins, a son-in-law of Bud Davis.

Traveling behind the Crow-Elkhart it was said, were two men in a truck. It is thought that they were present at the still at the time of the shooting.

There were conflicting reports as to the details of the shooting. According to one of the officers however there were two attacks.

How Shooting Occurred.

Utley lives in Moncure and is a Chatham officer. He and William Gilmore heard that the still was being operated. They proceeded to the vicinity of the still and concealed themselves, lying down on the ground. Messengers had been sent to Sanford and Utley and Gilmore were waiting for reinforcements to come up. While they waited four men came up. One of them pointed his gun directly at Utley at close range and fired. Gilmore begged them to spare his life and they told him according to report that they would not shoot if he would leave, which he did.

CHINESE GIRL FIGHTS BETROTHAL AS BABE

Parents of Village Ploughman Seek to Force Marriage to Rich Maiden.

Peking.—The legality of China's age-old system betrothing children before their birth is now being tried out in the High Court in Peking in a case where the girl refuses to marry the man to whose parents her parents promised her a few months before she was born. The girl is now rich and educated—the fiance is an ignorant village ploughman.

Twenty-two years ago a Mr. Han and a Mr. Tsao were both residents of the little wind-swept village of Tsai Yu Chen, on the plain south of Peking. They were neighbors and great friends, and before their children were born plighted them to marry if one should be a girl and one a boy. The Han baby is now the heroine of the present lawsuit and the Tsao boy is the one she wants to jilt.

But when the little girl was five years of age her father made money and removed to Peking. Here he has become very wealthy and the daughter has had advantages of colleges and foreign education. The Tsao boy has never been to school. His aged father is poor and is one of the village ploughmen.

Two months ago the boy's father sent word to Mr. Han that the time for the marriage had arrived. The girl met her uncouth fiance and rebelled. Now Mr. Tsao is suing in the Chinese courts—not for monetary damages but to force the father to force the girl to carry out a promise to marry made several months before she was born. All of the younger generation of Chinese are watching the case with intense interest.
