The Fad For Freak Laws

(New York World)

The legislator is at it again. In North Carolina he seeks to make "petting" illegal. In Oregon he would prohibit picture advertisements of cigarette smoking. In Indiana she—this time it is a lady—would require beauty-parlor experts to be of good health and moral character and picked by a state board. In Little Rock's municipal body Alderman Connor proposes that a pup shall be considered a dog when it becomes six months old. Because pelicans eat fish, a Texas legislator would appropriate \$25,000 to exterminate them.

To offset the famous Kansas cigarette legislation, now an admitted failure, a member of that state would prohibit mince pies, which are bad for children. Some son of Anak in the New Hampshire House wants hotel beds made seven feet long. A Pennsylvania solon would have members wear high hats, frock coats and spats to distinguish them from lobbyist. Senator Beaver of Oklahoma would forbid the manufacture of biscuits less than three inches across.

At this point one begins to suspect an element of sarcasm. Somebody was surely having his little joke when Mr. Chappelle of Ohio proposed to forbid the thermometer from going below 4 degrees in winter or above 78 in summer. And yet—possibly you cannot always tell. The Tennessee Legislature wasn't joking when it passed the Anti-Evolution Law.

Water as low in the Raleigh reservoir in February as during the dry weather last season has stirred the Raleigh authorities to increase their water supply, plans for the work, which will begin very soon, call for an expenditure of \$400,000.00. It is stated that a flow of 15 to 20 million gallons daily will be possible from the new source of supply and the city plans to have the water available in time to supply the city if the regular supply falls in the dry season. The present daily consumption in Raleigh is about 4,500,000 gallons but during last summer it was necessary to restrict the use of water, the new plans provide for future growth of the capital city.

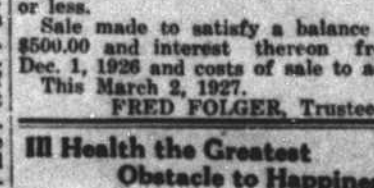

House Wiring Campaign Will End on March 21st

Liberal Financing Plan of Southern Public Utilities Company To Be Withdrawn

The liberal financing plan which we have been offering to customers and prospective customers on our lines will extend through March 21st. It will be withdrawn at the close of business on that day.

Under this offer more than 200 families in Mount Airy and its suburbs who have not heretofore enjoyed the advantages and comforts of electric service have been enabled to wire their homes and are today enjoying this service. The plan itself is very simple. The owner of the home selects the electrical contractor whom he desires to do his work. The contractor makes an estimate of the cost of the wiring and submits his bid. This bid must be accepted by the home owner and approved by our manager. The work is done and the Southern Public Utilities Company advances the amount of the contract so that the contractor gets his money immediately and the customer gets the advantage of a cash price. The cost of the installation is then divided into 12 parts and one-twelfth is repaid to the utilities company each month by the customer along with the electric light bill.

There are quite a number of families on existing lines in Mount Airy still who are using disagreeable, dangerous and inefficient oil lamps and are depriving themselves not only of electric light but of the other incidentals of electric service. Electric service is more than mere electric light. Many customers would prefer to do without electric light even than to be deprived of the comfort and satisfaction that comes through the use of electric irons and other electrical appliances.

For the benefit of those who have not yet had their homes wired and who desire to give their wives and families the advantages of electric service we are holding our house-wiring offer open until Monday, March 21st. Several days are required to secure estimates and make contracts. We would therefore urge those who are interested to act immediately in order that all steps necessary may be taken before this offer is withdrawn.
