

TAR HEEL JUDGE STICKS NEW YORKERS

New York, Feb. 11.—Judge Machine, who presided at the Eber run trial which resulted in the conviction to Atlanta penitentiary of the mayor and chief of police of Edgewater, N. J., today rescinded his action of yesterday in staying until May 10 the sentences of Dewitt Turner and Clifford and Cecil Kinder. Turner and the Kinder Chicagoans and owners of the run runner Eber, who pleaded guilty and turned government witnesses, were ordered immediately committed to the Tombs Prison. Cecil and Turner were given sentences of 18 months to Atlanta and Clifford Kinder to six months in the county jail.

Judge Machine reduced the sentence of Turner to a year and a day in Atlanta, but did not change the others and ordered them taken to the Tombs "to be confined until they can with convenient speed be removed to the place of imprisonment designated."

"But your honor," protested Assistant U. S. Attorney, Stichman, "your honor granted a stay of sen-

tence yesterday until May 10." "That is revoked," responded Judge Machine.

Judge Machine said that representatives of the Edgewater officials had gone to Washington and tried to retain one his best friends, for a fee, to intercede for them.

"I do not know how they knew that this gentleman was my friend" he said. "It all shows how far the ramifications of this ring go. A former high official came to me yesterday and pleaded for them, talking to me personally in their behalf and I have since learned that at the time he had a few from them in his pocket."

"Your purpose is to appeal to the President," Judge Machine continued, to counsel for the Kinder and Turner. "These men should be serving their sentences while the appeals are being made and they will be unless they die naturally or are numbered before they get to prison. I shall strongly represent to the President that in my opinion no clemency should be extended. Now Mr. Stichman, I don't want to hear another word about this case from anybody at any time. My mind is made up and my conscience clear. If you want to talk about the matter any more go before a judge. These men are going to jail unless the marshal refuses to do his duty and if he does I'll find a way to stir him up."

The Treasurer Apologizes From "Honest Abe"

Olympia, Wash., March 1.—Seventy-five years ago Abraham Lincoln accused a 9-year-old boy of stealing eggs. For a week the false charges resided in the heart of Jonathan Goodwin Crouch. Then he was called to the office of the struggling lawyer who was later to become the Great Emancipator to receive an apology.

New Crouch, who lives here and at 84 is hale and hearty, cherishes the incident of his heart. He considers he is the only person living to whom "Honest Abe" made a personal apology.

It happened in 1851. Crouch had gone with his father to Springfield, Ill., to sell farm products. He strayed from his father's wagon to explore a barn. As he emerged Lincoln drove up in a light buggy, called the boy to him, and quickly searched his clothing, explaining someone had been taking his eggs.

A week later word came to the Crouch farm Lincoln wanted to see Johnny at his office. Johnny went and the lawyer, offering him his hand, said: "I am sorry I accused you of stealing eggs. I want you to forgive me."
