Barren-Philathea Convention Date Changed.

The date for the convention of the State Barren-Philathea Association has been changed from May 18-23 to June 2-6 according to information given out by Mr. C. W. Andrew, general manager of plans for the convention which will be one of the outstanding events of the early summer in this city.

The committee on program decided on the change of date in order to secure the attendance of Miss Henrietta Heron, of Cincinnati, Ohio, who is not only a vice-president of the National Barren-Philathea Association but is one of the vice presidents of the World-Wide organization. She is also one of the editors of the Standard Publishing Co., of Cincinnati, Ohio, and nationally known for her writings. She has lectured all over the United States and Canada and many times over the radio. Her address "Life's Crosses" recently broadcast from Cincinnati will be given during the convention here by request. Miss Heron is well and favorably known in this state where she has visited former Barren-Philathea conventions and classes. She will be in attendance throughout the entire convention.

Dr. D. W. Daniel from Clemson College, S. C., is another noted speaker who will appear on the program. He is one of the most popular after-dinner speakers in America.

Hon. R. N. Simms, of Raleigh, no less appreciated because he belongs to our own state, a valued officer of the national organization will also be present.

More than thirty secretaries of the Stone Mountain Memorial Association met for instruction and inspiration at the O. Henry Hotel in Greensboro Saturday at a luncheon given by Mrs. T. J. Murphy, district chairman. Eleven counties were represented and plans for raising funds with which to carry on the work were discussed. Mr. Wells, state chairman of the association, was the chief speaker and others spoke briefly on the importance of the project and each secretary was given an opportunity for a brief word stating her difficulties, her encouragements or asking special help or information.

Any one in Surry wanting to enroll the names of their children in this Founders Roll which will be kept as a permanent memorial in a vault hewn out of stone in the face of the mountain, may do so by sending the name of the child or children, with one dollar for each child, to Mrs. P.
