Lohengrin's Wedding March was played as the bridal party entered the church and "At Dawning" was played softly during the ceremony.

Lindsay Holcomb, Grey Sydnor, Billie Carter and Walter Carter, all of this city, took their stand at the altar followed by Misses Nancy Jones, of Chatham, Va., and Elizabeth Norfleet, of Winston-Salem, both wearing green and carrying arm bouquets of deep pink roses and snapdragons, they crossed at the altar and took their stand behind the chancel, followed by two groomsmen, Messrs. William Sheppard and Forrest Wright, both of Winston-Salem, then Miss Helen Smith, of this city, and Miss Katherine Howard, of Greensboro, wearing pink and carrying pale pink roses and snapdragons, then Messrs. Charles Norfleet and Marcus Wilkinson, of Winston-Salem, they were followed by Miss Mary Martha Lybrook, of Winston-Salem, and Miss Katherine Gregory, of Greensboro, wearing yellow and carrying Madam Butterfly roses and yellow snapdragons, then came Messrs.
