TALE OF HORROR TOLD IN CHINA
The Refugees Arriving in Shanghai Bring Lurid Stories of Misery in City of Nanking.

Shanghai, March 26.—Refugees arriving here today from the Nanking district, where Cantonese soldiers, inflamed with anti-foreign hatred, went upon a wild and murderous rampage, brought lurid stories of misery, horror and suffering.

Although the Chinese, under threat of renewed bombardment by American and British warships, released many foreign residents at Nanking, including 120 Americans, who are now being evacuated to Shanghai, it is estimated that there are still about 30 Americans missing.

For a time Nanking was like a madhouse with the streets filled with southern soldiers armed with rifles and bayonets firing indiscriminately and screaming imprecations against the foreigners.

Columns of smoke arose from burning buildings.

The American, British and Japanese consulates swarmed with Chinese. Mobs followed the soldiers hoping to participate in the pillaging. Little groups of foreigners fled through side streets to places of safety. Many Americans took refuge in the missions, the theological seminary, the Hill Crest school and the warehouses of American enterprises.

A mob composed of Cantonese troops and lawless civilians attacked the schools and they were set on fire. Then began another flight. Soldiers tried to bar the way. Some of the women were brutally handled by the Chinese who tried to tear the clothing from their bodies.

The mob spread about after the attack upon the consulates and soon columns of smoke were rolling upward from the homes of Americans.

Many Americans took refuge at the Standard Oil plant. It was after the Americans sought safety there that the American warcraft in the harbor laid down a barrage to drive off the Chinese and protect the refugees.
