

The Present Outlook For Peaches in Western Part of State is Very Promising.

The prospects for a peach crop at the present time is more promising in the counties at and near the foot hills of the Blue Ridge in the mountains. Recent observation indicate a good crop of most varieties with the exception of the Elberta and Helen, however, on older trees of these two varieties there are many young peaches still remaining. In view of these prospects, you should insure this present crop against the pests of Brown Rot and Scab. It is about time to begin spraying.

Two weeks after the "shades" were shading which was the time you sprayed last for the peach fruit worm or curculio. By the time you get the spray pump and spray material ready you should begin spraying.

What to Use—You have the choice of two preparations:

1. Self-boiled lime sulphur—Place 8 pounds of stone lime in a 50 gallon barrel and slake with hot water. As soon as slaking starts add 8 pounds of sulphur made in a thin paste, stir constantly and add water to prevent burning, but too much water will drown the lime and cause the slaking to stop too soon. After the mixture has boiled about 5 minutes (longer if poor grade lime is used) cool off with water, strain into spray tank and add

enough water to make 50 gallons. Care should be observed to cool the mixture before red streaks appear to any extent, as this is an indication of over heating. It should be used immediately after preparation.

2. Dry-mix lime sulphur—This can be purchased thru any dealer in spray materials. It is a powder form ready to stir in the water. Follow the directions as recommended by the manufacturer. Do not confuse this with the dry lime sulphur which is also in powder form, used for control of scale insects and apple diseases.

Insure your grapes against the rot—Two applications will largely control the Black Rot of grapes. 1st application to be put on when the second set of leaves are appearing. 2nd application, after berries are formed. Use Bordeaux Mixture: 3 pounds bluestone, 4 pounds lime and 50 gallons water. This formula has been used by the Mountain Experiment Station in Buncombe County with perfect control of Brown Rot. If you don't know how to make it, write and I'll give you the directions. If you have only a few vines purchase the Bordeaux paste or Pyrec from your dealer in spray materials and follow directions on the package.

Protect cherry trees from leaf spots and fruit worm—When most flowers have fallen spray with 5 qts. of liquid lime sulphur or 3 lbs. dry lime sulphur in 50 gallons of water. About 2 weeks later spray again spray with lime sulphur. If you are troubled with worms in cherries, add 1 1-2 lbs. arsenate of lead to the diluted lime sulphur, always adding poison last.

Michigan to Use Whipping Post.

Lansing, Mich., April 7.—The whipping post for bank robbers and other felons was approved by an almost unanimous vote of the house of representatives here.

The bill provides that bank robbers be given "from ten to twenty strokes of the lash well laid on" every six months up to 300 strokes.

Fred R. King spoke in favor of the bill. Once he said he got tired of a neighbor's practice of beating his wife.

"I beat the neighbor good," King said, "and it cured him. I think it would cure bank robbers."

The bill now goes to the senate. It seems probable the upper body will concur.

BOLD BANDITS MAKE ESCAPE WITH BIG HAUL

Board Train and Rob Express Car As Flyer Speeds On Through Night to Chicago.

Chicago, April 7.—The southwestern fringe of Chicago was being combed today for two bandits who last night held up the Lincoln Limited, crack Chicago and Alton passenger train, and escaped with loot variously estimated at between \$2,500 and \$30,000. Only the baggage car was entered. None of the passengers nor the engine crew was aware of the robbery.

The bandits boarded the train as it moved out of Juliet last night. One wore an army overcoat. They donned black net masks, drew revolvers and pushed their way into the baggage car.

There they encountered Conductor James Connery and A. A. Gotthoff, express messenger. Connery was bound and gagged and rolled in a corner before Gotthoff could execute their orders to open the safe, Frank Wenglass, diner chef, and George Mitchell, a porter, walked into the car. Undismayed, the bandits calmly tied up Wenglass and Mitchell and rolled them in the corner with Connery. Gotthoff was then forced to open the safe. The bandits took the entire contents and sorted it carefully. Currency and negotiable papers were divided equally between them.

All other papers, including non-negotiable bonds, were piled on the floor of the car and burned. The bandits then trussed up Gotthoff and rolled him against the others. After going through their victims' pockets, obtaining \$150 more, the bandits left the train.
