NOTICE

Ordinance Authorizing the Levying of Taxes for School Purposes in the Town of Mount Airy and the Issuing of Bonds for School Improvements.

Be it resolved, ordered and ordained by the Board of Commissioners of the Town of Mount Airy, in regular session held at the Town Hall in Mount Airy on May 12th, 1927. Same being a recess of the regular meeting of May 3rd, 1927:

Section 1. That an election be and the name is called to be held in the two voting precincts in the Town of Mount Airy, to-wit: Ward No. 1 and ward No. 2 on the 20th day of June, 1927, at which time and in which election the question of the levying of a tax of sixty cents on the one hundred dollar valuation of property and one dollar and eighty cents (\$1.80) on the poll for school purposes shall be submitted to the qualified registered voters for said election as provided by an act of the General Assembly of North Carolina, ratified the 21st day of February, 1927, and in said election those favoring the levying of said tax for school purposes as provided for in the said act of the General Assembly shall vote a ballot with the words "for schools" written or printed thereon, and those who oppose the levying of said tax shall vote a ballot with the words "against schools" written or printed thereon.

Sec. 2. That for the said election, a new registration of the voters in each of the wards, to-wit: Ward No. 1 and Ward No. 2, is hereby ordered, and that E. H. Dixon be and he is hereby named Registrar for Ward No. 1; and J. Graham Harrison and E. H. Hennis are named and appointed Judges of Election in Ward No. 1; That Cecil Carter be and he is hereby named and appointed Registrar in Ward No. 2, and that Thomas B. Ashby and Mal Davis are appointed and named Judges of Election in Ward No. 2.

Sec. 3. That the Registration Books be opened on Monday morning, May 23rd, 1927, at 9 o'clock A. M., and remain open within each of the two precincts until sundown on the 18th day of June, 1927, and that said books for the registration of voters shall remain open in each precinct each day except Sunday from 9 o'clock A. M. until 6 o'clock P. M., and shall be kept at the polling places on each and every Saturday during the period of registration from sunrise to sunset.

Sec. 4. That notice of the election and notice of the registration by publication of these ordinances in the Mount Airy News for four weeks, at least, prior to the closing of the registration books and prior to the holding of said election, shall be given; and these ordinances are ordered to be published beginning May 19th and continuing for each week during the time the registration books shall remain open.

Sec. 5. That at the election called and ordered and to be held for the purpose of ascertaining the will of the people as to the levying of taxes as hereinbefore defined for school purposes, there shall also be submitted to the registered voters registered for said election the question of issuing fifty thousand dollars (\$50,000.00) bonds for the purpose of rais-

ing funds or revenue to construct and improve school buildings within the Town of Mount Airy, and that those favoring the issuing of said bonds, which bonds shall bear such rate of interest, not exceeding 5% per cent, and shall be either serial bonds or term bonds, as the Board of Commissioners may decide, shall vote a ballot or ticket reading as follows, "For School Improvement" and those voting against said bonds shall vote a ticket, written or printed, reading as follows, "Against School Improvement."

Sec. 6. That at said election herein called, there shall be submitted to the registered voters registered for said election the further question of levying a tax of not exceeding six cents on the one hundred dollar valuation and eighteen cents on each poll, for the purpose of paying off and retiring notes and other evidences of debt accumulated or now outstanding incurred in the maintenance of the schools of the Town of Mount Airy; and in said election those favoring the levying of said tax shall vote a written or printed ballot reading as follows, "For Liquidating School Debt," and those opposing said tax shall vote a ballot or ticket written or printed, reading as follows, "Against Liquidating School Debt."

Sec. 9. That the questions submitted to the registered voters shall be and are deemed separate and distinct questions and provisions, and a separate box for each of the three proposals in each of the wards shall be provided, and the defeat of one proposal shall not affect any other proposal, but each shall be declared and determined according to the vote cast, for each of the several and distinct propositions.

Sec. 10. That the qualification of voters proposing to register for said election shall be as is now provided by law and that the result of the election shall be declared and determined upon the new registration hereby and herein ordered for said election, and the new registration ordered shall be and is applicable to each of the proposals to be submitted to the voters in said election.

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J. D. Norwood At Last Reaches Atlanta Pen

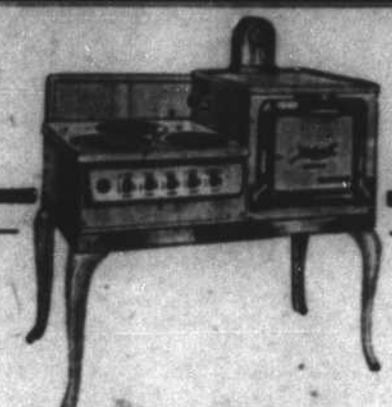
Atlanta, Ga., June 1.—J. D. Norwood, former chairman of the North Carolina state democratic executive committee, arrived at the Federal penitentiary here last night to begin serving a three-year sentence for violation of the national banking laws growing out of the failure of the Peoples National Bank of Salisbury, N. C. on June 8, 1925.

His presence in the prison did not become known here until tonight. Authorities did not reveal under what circumstances the former banker came to the penitentiary.

Recently he was known to have been in Chicago and Florida, but no intimation has been given as to whether he came here voluntarily or was brought to prison in custody. Thus, after several years of intermittent hearings, trials, and pleas, was placed the final touch upon a case which attracted state-wide interest and which acquired a large and interested following because of the nature of the charges involved.

Norwood was indicted by the grand jury in United States district court in Greensboro in December, 1925, nearly six months after the failure of the institution of which he was chairman of the board of directors and a stockholder.

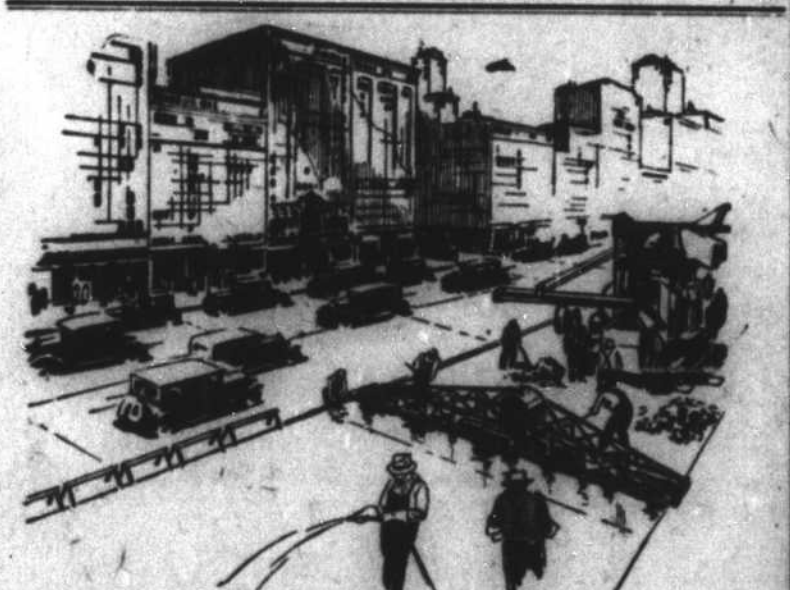
