Armfield, Supt. of Public Welfare, Surry County, for the month of May, 1927: Juvenile work—number of dependents, 2; number of delinquents, 4; disposition of court cases, private home placements, 2; dismissed, 1; disposition of other cases, reprimanded and warned, 3; institutional commitments—one young man carried to sanatorium; one young man returned from sanatorium half day spent with Miss Ryncer, representative Childrens Home Society, Greensboro, N. C.; school attendance—absence reported, 26; investigated by letter, 19; investigated by visit, 7; visits to schools, 15; prosecution of parents, 4; poor relief—cases reported, 11; committed to County Home, 2; removed from county home, 1; given temporary aid by county, 4; more calls in May than any month since 1925. Conferences—Board members, 4; Juvenile court, 3;

visits—mothers aid, 2; jail, 2; County Home, 3; inspections—factory, 7; investigations for agencies, 4; Childrens Home Society, 2; Durham County Welfare Dept., 1; Associated Charities, Pittsburg, Pa., 1; Official trips outside of county, 1; Miles traveled, 1,300; letters written, 120; working permits issued, 2.

The report of H. E. White, county farm agent, for the month of May, 1927, is as follows: Miles traveled, 948; days in field, 19; days in office, 7; days worked, 26; visits to farmers, 90; office conferences 264; letters written, 91; method demonstrations, 4; attendance, 18; visit to result demonstrations, 78; other meetings, 14; attendance, 472; letters received, 46; circular letters, 4; total copies, 3,407; articles written, 4; copies, 13; communities visited 48; visits by specialists—E. Y. Floyd, tobacco specialist, E. C. Blair, Extension Agronomist. Mr. White has started five different demonstrations on fertilization of tobacco this year, and 3 on the fertilization of corn and 1 on soy beans. The German fertilizer industry has furnished over 1,000 pounds of high grade fertilizer for demonstration purposes in the county. About 200 pounds of synthetic calcium nitrate was placed on the court house lawn

and a very heavy growth of grass and weeds were produced. This calcium nitrate was furnished free to the county. Mr. E. C. Blair, Extension Agronomist, was well pleased with the two meetings held on May 16th. He thinks the results secured are very satisfactory. The county home has secured three pure bred Guernseys as a start to building up a fine bunch of dairy cattle.
