

Going Through Georgia

For some time I have been interested in knowing more about my own state of North Carolina and the rest of Dixie. Recently the opportunity came and I made a hurried trip through South Carolina and Georgia. I might say here that we are not beautiful when we say that the State of North Carolina is wonderful and every true patriotic citizen should make an effort to see North Carolina first.

From Greensboro to Kings Mountain we pass, not one or two thriving cities, but one after another, prosperous ones, the highway between the above mentioned places is wonderful.

South Carolina was a surprise. The roads, its farming sections, its towns

and cities have all the marks of prosperity.

The section of country through North Carolina, South Carolina and Georgia cannot be surpassed for picturesque.

Georgia roads are fair but she is taking steps toward hard surface and will soon, no doubt, be on an equal footing with her sister states.

The most wonderful natural curiosity in Georgia and probably any where is Stone Mountain. We should all work for and see to it that the Confederate Memorial, now under construction, is completed to the last detail. I have never seen anything so inspiring as this project, so deserving both the South's as well as the Nation's support.

The following is a brief summary of its purpose as well as description: Stone Mountain, is sixteen miles east of Atlanta in DeKalb County, Georgia. A mountain of stone, 5,000 feet long, seven miles around the base, and a mile to the summit up the sloping side.

On its northern side, Stone Mountain

tain drops in a sheer, naked precipice almost a thousand feet from summit to base.

Across this mountain of granite Augustus Lehman is carving an indestructible monument to the men and women who sacrificed themselves for the Southern Confederacy.

Beginning on the right near the mountain's summit and sweeping downward and across it a distance of thirteen hundred feet will be carved in full relief a panorama representing the Confederate armed forces marching into battle. On the right will be artillery, appearing at the summit as if coming from beyond, and dropping down over and across the precipices in life-like procession. Next will be cavalry in rapid motion. Then the central group, shown in the picture, consisting of Jefferson Davis, Robert E. Lee, Stonewall Jackson and other great chieftains of the Confederate high command. General Lee in this group will be as tall as a sixteen story office building, and the others in proportion. No sculptured figures of ancient or modern times can be compared with these in magnitude or grandeur. Swinging off to the left of the central group will be column upon column of Confederate gray-clad infantry carved in the gray and everlasting granite.

Memorial Hall will be quarried out of the mountain immediately underneath the central group. Thirteen incisions will be made, forming the windows and central entrance, each one dedicated to a Confederate State.

At the base of the mountain, to the right of Memorial Hall, will be built the amphitheater. The granite removed from Memorial Hall will supply the material.

It has thrilled the imagination of the world. Its cost is estimated at \$3,500,000.

The cyclorama of the Battle of Atlanta at Grants Park is another marvel and that, if nothing else, pays for the expense of a visit to Atlanta.

Oglethorpe and Emory Universities and the Georgia School of Technology, are places of interest and give character to the wonderful city. The home of "Uncle Remus" (Joel Chandler Harris) is another remarkable place of interest.

For conclusion I will say that I have given only a brief account of a few of Atlanta's places of interest. Should I take time to tell you of her office buildings, and places of business, her hotels, and wonderful residential sections, one paper could hardly give it space. I suggest that you take the same trip and see for yourselves.

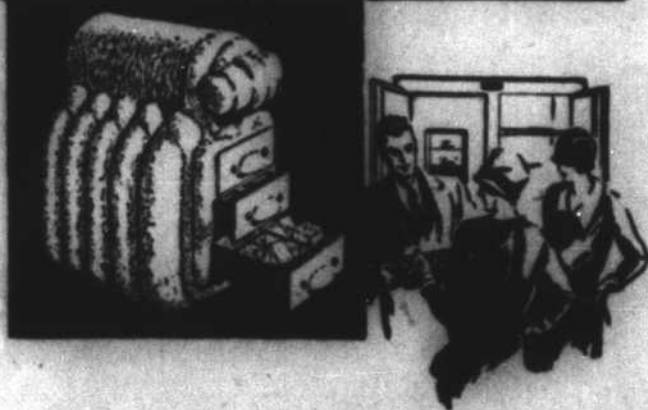
