Sixteen Treated For Hydrophobia

Salisbury, Sept. 2.—Sixteen people are being given treatment at stated intervals by the Surry county health department for hydrophobia prevention, ten of these having come in contact with a cow that was afflicted and six having been bitten by a dog. The ten persons that came in contact with the cow are in the China Grove section. Recently a cow in the neighborhood where these people live became sick and ten persons assisted in administering to the ill animal. It developed later that the cow was affected with rabies, having evidently been bitten by a rabid dog at some time shortly previous, but nothing was known of this. When it developed that the cow had rabies all those who had been in close contact with her through aiding in treatment were advised to take the treatment. The other six persons being treated are from the negro section of East Spenser, where a bulldog pup belonging to a negro man, went on a rampage, having hydrophobia and bit these six, several cows and a mule and probably other persons, being later killed.

TUNNEY SAYS FIGHT WILL BE BOXING EXHIBITION

Champion Assures Chicago That He Does Not Intend To Fight—Only Ben

Chicago, Sept. 2.—Gene Tunney must be convinced by this time that he is a popular champion, at least in Chicago where he will fight his first battle in defense of his title three weeks hence. Not since war days has such throngs turned out to greet a popular figure. Crowds which swelled up the reception committee, bands, guards, and all, almost overwhelmed the champion from the time he alighted from the Twentieth Century Limited until he disappeared in the suburbs en route to his camp at the Cedar Crest Country club.

As official host, not only to the fight itself but to the champion, George F. Gota introduced Tunney to Mayor William Hale Thompson and the aldermen in the city hall council chamber and assured Gena that "today's reception is only a forerunner of what you can expect of Chicago."

Through the din of cheers Tunney made an effort to correct an impression about the "fight" at Soldiers' field, September 22.

"I am not going to take part in any fight," Tunney said. "I am going to engage in a boxing match and I like them. And I promise you that I shall box to the best of my ability on the evening of the 22nd."

Through the packed streets Tunney was escorted to lunch with Tex Rickard and later to his camp at Fox lake. En route there the champion had an opportunity to give first aid to one of his escorts. A motorcycle officer, Frank Truba struck a hole in the road and crashed into two fellow officers. Tunney was the first to reach the injured man and helped him into another car.

The sight of 10,000 hero-worshippers jammed into the New York Central station as his train came in, startled him at first and by the time he had been pulled and shoved into the official automobile most of his routine had been left behind including Tex Rickard.

Cornered by the girl reporters as he left the hotel for his camp the champion said he was never going to marry.

"Are you engaged?" he was asked. "I'm engaged to fight, that's all," Gena said with a grin. "I'm never going to marry. I'm not the marrying kind. Why? Oh—" as he hesitated for a serious answer. "My manager will not let me."

This Old Straw Hat Brings Nothing But Bad Luck

Chicago, Aug. 31.—Taps is drawing near for straw hats, and the sooner it sounds the better pleased will be Peter Murray, of Edgewater Beach. In fact, Mr. Murray does not intend to ever wear a straw hat again and any person who discusses such headgear with him from now on is flirting with the undertaker.

Day before yesterday he looked at the old lid and found it somewhat frowny and sunburned. So he bought a cap and took a taxi home with the straw bonnet in a bag beside him. He figured it might come in handy for fishing.

SLAYER FREED ON MURDER CHARGE

Trial Justice Excuses Lynch Law Practiced By Groups

Danville, Va., Sept. 2.—Charles W. Wilson, accused of killing J. C. Sparrow ten days ago was acquitted of murder late this afternoon after three magistrates had heard strong arguments by the defense and the State which asked that the case be sent to the grand jury. As the decision was rendered a large crowd in a hall at Schoolfield, where the floozie took place, burst into shouts and cheers. Wilson suddenly became a hero and had a handshaking box. Carter was applauded during his address in which he dealt reluctantly and with unbridled tongue with "bands of men, hooded or not, who seek to improve conditions by meddling with someone's business." He excoriated the magistrate who asked the investigation of Wilson's home on the strength of an anonymous letter and compelled him to admit that the law had been violated in the issuance of a liquor search warrant when it was intended to disclose other evidence. He enumerated five lawless acts undertaken admittedly by Constable T. C. Oakes, who led the party and said that it was the band and not Wilson who should be investigated, and that Wilson had committed no unlawful act. The State asked for grand jury action on the ground that Wilson knew that it was Oakes who was at the door and that he had no right to shoot at random.

Davie Man Convicted For Burning His Barn

Mocksville, Sept. 2.—Convicted of burning his barn for the purpose of collecting \$10,350 insurance, Luke C. Deadmon, Davie county farmer, was sentenced here today in Superior court to serve not less than 10 years nor more than 15 years at hard labor in the state.

The jury reached its verdict after deliberating for one hour, and the sentence was imposed by Judge McElroy.

R. O. Kyle, chief witness for the state, testified that on the night of August 25, 1925, he saw Deadmon enter his barn, light a candle and place it in a box filled with shavings after he had saturated them with kerosene oil. Kyle said he was afraid to tell what he saw because Deadmon had threatened to kill him. He added that he had been "shot at" several times before he went before the grand jury in March.
