

SPECIAL TERM FOR WILKES BANK FAILURE

Will Begin at Wilkesboro Monday, December 12—Wrenn Central Figure.

Raleigh, Oct. 1.—Governor McLean today called a special term of court for Wilkes county to try the cases growing out of the collapse of the Bank of Wilkes in Wilkesboro.

The date is Monday, December 12. Governor McLean chose this time for the trial of the bank cases after Solicitor J. R. Jones had asked for a special term. The cases of greatest interest will be those growing out of the alleged forged notes. Assuming that all the returns are in, there are outstanding \$125,000 of these.

Most prominent in the indictment will be the popular Clem Wrenn, president of the defunct bank, and well known citizen of the county. This defendant has been under treatment three months or more and is now in Southern Pines undergoing special care. When warrants were sworn out against him following the discovery of the first alleged forgery of \$25,000, Clem Wrenn was in West brook sanatorium, Richmond, Virginia. Instead of remaining sick and resisting extradition, he hopped up from bed and came on the first car leaving Richmond. He went to his home in North Wilkesboro, gave bond and lay there for weeks.

Meanwhile some sort of statement was given out in which the stricken president appeared to have admitted the responsibility for the alleged forgeries, but the next morning there was a statement denying that he had made any such confessions. Thus far the former president has not betrayed his defense. Nobody has any idea what will be his plea.

There are other criminal indictments against prominent citizens of Wilkes. Not all of them are of the same political party. This term of court will try six or more of those, citizens if the solicitor remains in his present state of mind. But the alleged forgeries will furnish all the real excitement. Indictments for these violations have been drawn and bills found.

the previous week and a decrease in receipts of 297,021 pounds.

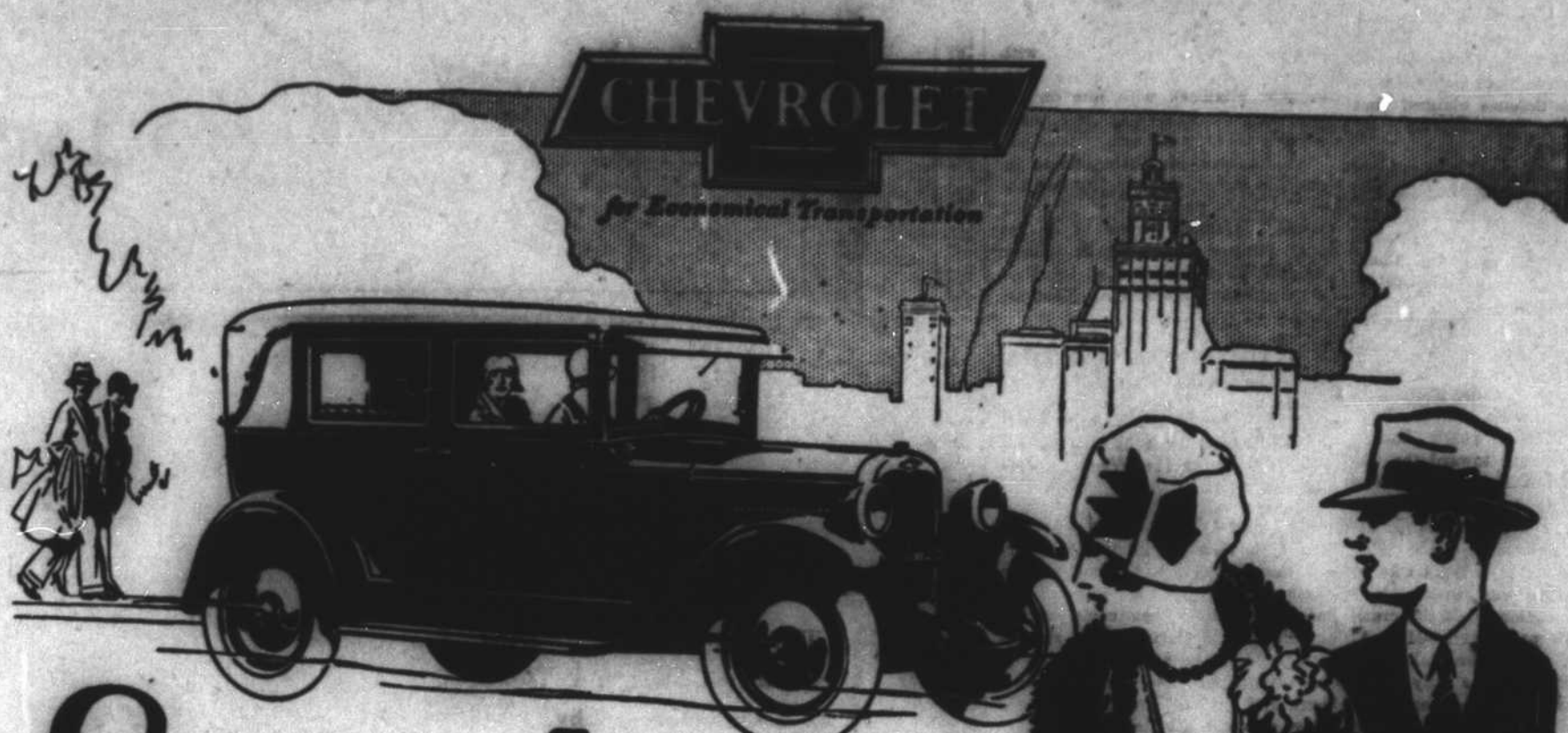
