HEROIC RESCUE OF YEAR-OLD SISTER

Boy Lowers Rope into Well, Fastens It and Slides Down

Smithfield, Oct. 9.—Frank Baker, the fourteen year old son of Mr. and Mrs. Clem Baker, who resides near Pine Level, yesterday made a heroic rescue of his one year old sister, Mary Elizabeth, after the child had been thrown into a twenty foot well by her insane mother.

At the time that the mother attempted to dash her child to such a tragic death, there was no one present except a nearby Negro woman, who, seeing the woman with the baby, suspected foul play and examined the well immediately. On giving the alarm the fourteen year old boy rushed to the rescue and lowered the bucket down to the struggling child and upon securing the rope to the well curbing he slid down it and gathered the sinking form of the child into his arms. In this manner he held on to the child until other aid

could come to draw him and the strangled child to land. Efforts of resuscitation were immediately employed and the child was soon revived.

Known to be Insane

It is definitely known that the woman is insane. On several occasions prior to this time she has made attempts to destroy her baby, having resorted to giving her broken glass and poisons. However, in an interview with Mrs. D. J. Thurston, County Welfare Officer, today, she stated that the child lurched forward and fell into the well when she went there to draw water. This is disbelieved as she made no attempt to rescue the child or to call in aid.

Mrs. Thurston took both the insane woman and the baby into her custody. Application for her admission to the State Hospital has been made and the baby has been temporarily placed with relatives in Fayetteville.

There are some features of this tragic attempt at destroying the child which are incapable of explanation. No one seems to understand how the child struggled for five or ten minutes in ten foot of water without sinking, while the forethought and well laid plans of the fourteen year old boy to rescue the child is of equal wonder to the neighbors who soon gathered at the Baker home.

\$45,000 From Sale of Game License

Raleigh, Oct. 6.—Remittances from district wardens for game licenses received to noon, October 6, by the department of conservation and development amounted to approximately \$45,000, exceeding the expectations of even the most enthusiastic sportsmen in the state. Quite a number of counties have reported license sales well over \$2,000 for September.

Splendid reports are coming from most all sections of the state, both as to sale of licenses and cooperation of sportsmen and people generally in the administration of the law. "From letters and messages being received here at Raleigh," said J. K. Dixon, assistant director, "wardens in charge of the enforcement of the law are having very little trouble getting the support and co-operation of people generally in the enforcement of the game law. Approximately 100,000 licenses have been distributed among clerks of the court, wardens and other selling agents from the 141,000 ordered and we don't anticipate any further trouble in keeping licenses in hands of issuing officers."
