MAMMOTH BREWERY FOUND IN DETROIT

Liquor Making Outfit and Fashionable Night Club Covered Block.

Detroit, Nov. 10.—A subterranean brewery, its intricate system of basements and passageways yielding beer and liquor making paraphernalia worth half a million dollars, has been found by federal prohibition agents a few steps from Detroit's main artery, Woodward avenue.

So extensive was the plant that it occupied an entire city block of basements and most of the office buildings above. Dan Vacarelli, prohibition administrator, believes that in the discovery of the giant plant last night his office has uncovered the main source of the supply to many of Detroit's blind pigs and bars.

A fashionable night club, which was believed to be the headquarters and general offices of the underground plant, was deserted when Vacarelli and nine agents arrived at an hour picked as most liable to catch

the after-theatre crowd.

In the dining room, where nearly 200 tables were set, many laden with steaming viands, there were evidences of a hasty exit by patrons. A few tables had been overturned. From racks in the check rooms were hung coats and hats left behind in the hurried departure.

150 Foot Bar

On a 150-foot bar at the rear of the dining room were glasses containing beer or whiskey which patrons had not taken time to consume as word of the impending raid was received. Behind the bar the serving counter was stocked full.

Most elaborate was the plant outfit, most lavish was the liquor-making equipment. Included in contraband which the agents seized were:

A beer vat, containing 25,000 gallons of beer, several hundred barrels of beer; a large quantity of bottled beer, 11 cases of whisky; 18 5,000 gallon vats of beer; three 25,000 gallon vats of beer; a ton and a half of filterered paper pulp, used in purifying beer; three 30,000 gallon wooden whiskey tanks, empty. A

large ammonia refrigerating plant; a "racker" machine used in filling kegs; five large automobile trucks.

No Arrests

After more than an hour's investigation agents found a cleverly concealed trap door of steel leading to a basement. At one end of the basement another trap door was discovered. This led to a large room, extending nearly a quarter of a block where an elaborate beer making plant had been installed.

Owners of the property are to be subpoenaed for questioning in connection with the raid.

No one was arrested, and there was no indication as to who owned or operated the plant.
