REV. WILLIAM BLACK DIES

Widely Known Evangelist Taken Suddenly Ill During Evangelistic Meeting

Greensboro, Nov. 25.—News was received here last night of the death of Rev. William Black, D. D., of Charlotte, general evangelist of the Presbyterian Church of the south of North Carolina, who died early yesterday afternoon at Wade where he had been holding an evangelistic meeting. He became suddenly ill Tuesday afternoon and died about 1:30 o'clock yesterday afternoon.

Rev. Mr. Black was prominently identified with the Presbyterian church in the state where he had carried on his evangelistic work for the last 35 years. He had held meetings in cities throughout the state and on several occasions led meetings in Greensboro. Through his work and his own personality he had endeared himself to a host of friends. He was known and loved by thousands of people to whom he had preached in his years of service.

Prior to joining the ministry, Mr. Black had conducted a law office at Maxton, following this profession for about 10 years.

"I see that you've given up teaching your wife to drive."

SEVEN MEN IN CALIFORNIA PRISON

Deadly Accuracy of Snipers in Fighting Off Rebel Prisoners Hastened Surrender.

Folsom Prison, Calif., Nov. 25.—Mysteriously beleaguered by a force of national guardsmen and civil officers equipped with weapons of war, revolting convicts at the state penitentiary here meekly surrendered today, ending a mutiny in which 11 men were killed and more than a score wounded.

Threats by Warden Court Smith that the cell house in which 1,200 of the prisoners were barricaded would be flooded and that the rebels would be starved out contributed to the collapse of the mutiny, but the deadly accuracy of riflemen stationed on a hill overlooking the prison was the principal factor in the capitulation.

Nine convicts and two prison guards lost their lives in the pitched battle waged yesterday between the rebellious prisoners and the besiegers. Seventeen convicts were wounded and four guards injured.

Six convicts declared by the warden to have been the ring leaders in the uprising were placed in solitary confinement. Murder charges would be filed against them, Warden Smith declared.

Only Few Involved

Only a few of the 1,200 prisoners in the cell house were actively involved in the outbreak, which started late yesterday morning, the warden said, claiming the others were intimidated by the leaders.

The surrender came this morning after Warden Smith had communicated over the telephone with two spokesmen for the mutineers.

While 500 national guardsmen, equipped with machine guns, tanks, sawed off shot guns, tear bombs and one pounders, and 200 heavily armed civil officers commanded the cell house, the convicts surrendered their weapons to four guards who had been held as hostages.

The guards had not been injured and came out of the building laden with weapons, including two pistols, an axe and a number of knives.

In quick order the convicts then were sent to their cells.

There had been no hostilities during the night, the fighting having flared out after the ammunition of the convicts ran low and the attacking forces had turned a hail of machine gun bullets into the cell house yesterday.

Withhold Fire

State officials, fearing that the imprisoned guards would be killed and feeling that the mutineers were weakening, withheld further attacks on the building, but warned that they were ready to resume action in the event of further overt acts on the part of the convicts.

Warden Smith was called on the telephone from the turnkey's office by an unidentified prisoner, who wanted an agreement that if the convicts surrendered they would not be abused. This was agreed to.

Then the spokesman asked assurance that the ringleaders would not be hanged. The warden told him this was ridiculous, and it was finally agreed that the men would surrender on condition that those placed in solitary confinement would not be kept on bread and water but would be given one meal a day.

Arrange Surrender

The warden demanded to speak to one of the ringleaders and eventually another prisoner came to the telephone and made arrangements for surrendering the weapons of the convicts.

Aged Lady Passes

Mrs. Blanche A. Cobbler, wife of James K. Cobbler died at their home near Round Peak Thursday. The funeral will take place Friday at 2 p. m. at Woodville with the Rev. Messrs. Hall and Smith officiating.

SENATOR CAPPER FOR LARGER CORN DUTIES

Says Government Should Help Farmers—Urges Investigation of Meat Costs.

Washington, Nov. 27.—Some real help can be given to the farmer by the tariff commission and the President, Senator Capper, Republican, Kansas, asserts in a letter to the commission urging increased duties on corn and an investigation of the difference in the cost of meat production in this country and abroad.

"There may be some question as to what form of farm relief shall be provided by Congress," Senator Capper wrote, "and there is no doubt that this matter will be discussed at great length during the coming session. But I feel that all fair-minded men in the nation are willing to grant to the food producers that protection from cheap foreign competition to which they are so obviously entitled."

Senator Capper at one time leader of the farm bloc in the senate, wrote Chairman Marvin, of the commission, that he felt sure that when the results of the corn production costs went to President Coolidge the President would see "that it is only a matter of simple justice to give the corn growers of the United States this additional protection (from 15 cents to 22 1-2 cents a bushel) which they need so badly and which he has the power to grant."

As to the duties on meats, Senator Capper said it was "quite evident" that the present duties are "absolutely inadequate" to give American producers proper protection. Pointing to increased meat imports from Canada during the present year as compared with last year, he added: "Isn't it possible in this high protection" country to give farmers ample consideration when it comes to protecting them from cheap foreign labor?"

"I can see no justice in compelling the rural people of America to pay inflated prices for industrial products required in the operation of their farms and then provide only alleged protection for their products, which allows every 'Tom, Dick and Harry' of a foreign producer to ride over the tariff wall and throw a monkey wrench into our market structure almost at will."

Here's a New Bootleg Scheme

Spartanburg, Nov. 25.—When prohibition officers visited the farm of Sam Akers near the Cherokee and Spartanburg County line, they discovered something new in bootlegging.

Akers was arrested when the officers found four gallons of whiskey hidden in a novel way on Akers premises. The officers found the whiskey in a barn after a long search. It was hidden under a trough.

The trough was made into two sections, one telescoping the other so as to leave space at the bottom for the jars of whiskey.

The two parts of the trough fitted snugly and it was not until an officer worked over the receptacle a few minutes that he noticed a looseness about it and lifted the false bottom to expose the hidden intoxicants.

Officers also found 15 gallons of whiskey hidden in a field near Appalache, but no arrests were made.
