## Only Few Involv

Only a few of the 1,200 prise in the cell house were actively in-volved in the outbreak, which started late yesterday morning, the war-den said, claiming the others were intimidated by the leaders.

The surrender came this morning after Warden Smith had communicated over the telephone with spokesmen for the mutineers.
