What the Mount Airy Club Did

Johnnie Norman was a fourteen year old mountain boy, living with his widowed mother and two small brothers at the foot of the Blue Ridge mountains. He and his mother earned a livelihood by gathering Galax leaves for a florist. Last spring a neighbor who had moved seventy miles away persuaded Johnnie who had never been more than five miles from home to go with him to his new location and work for him. Johnnie went and worked out \$14.55, his employer generously paid him off with a shot gun, thus was achieved Johnnie's great ambition to become the owner of a gun.

He walked and begged his way back home and the next morning took his gun and started out to show his mother and brothers how it would shoot but just as he stepped out of the door he dropped the gun and it discharged and shot Johnnie's left leg almost in two just above his ankle. A member of the Kiwanis Club of Mount Airy found Johnnie and brought him to a local hospital along with his mother, a neighbor agreed to care for the younger children who had to be in school. The mother was penniless and ignorant and insisted that the foot not be removed as recommended by the surgeons. For three weeks Johnnie lay in the hospital and was deaf to all advice that he have this limb amputated until finally another member of the Kiwanis club of Mount Airy visited him in the hospital and told him that if he would consent to the removal of the foot the club would pay all expenses incident thereto and buy him an artificial limb as soon as he was able to wear it. Johnnie said, "Mister, I want 'em to take it off if you will help me get me a new leg and I shore will work and pay for it, and I shore want 'em to save my foot and give it to me 'cause I want it buried like white folks."

Johnnie's foot was amputated, he went home and his bill was paid, his younger brothers furnished clothing and school books and the mother supplied with bandage and with the things necessary to take care of Johnnie until he is ready for his artificial limb.

On his last day in the hospital Johnnie remarked as follows "Them Kiwanis shore is a fine thing and when I git growed up I aim to jine one of them lodges."

Johnnie had a box of candy on the table in his room and when asked where it came from said: "The purtiest gal I ever seed fetch that to me and when I git well I shore aim to marry her."
