Thrift Bank

The Young Tar Heel Farmer boys of Debono High school met in the agricultural classroom November 9, 1927 and organized a Thrift Bank.

The first thing done was the election of officers. The following boys were given this position: Price Todd, Theodore Chappel, Lovell Hodges, and Boyd Stanley.

The board then met and elected the officers of the bank as follows: President, Henry Burch; vice president, Weaver Alberty; secretary, Thelma Alberty; cashier, Walter Johnson. After the election of officers they were sworn in and each took the seat of his respective office.

The board of directors wrote out the constitution which read as follows:

Every member must deposit at least \$16 per school year for continued membership. They must deposit 50c per week or the average of that much in advance or more. Four per cent interest is given on all savings accounts.

Motto—Use money for higher education.

Withdrawal—Graduates can draw money out May 1, of year they graduate. Any one leaving school may draw their money out at leaving. The other members may use the money as follows: For increase project work which is to be returned to bank at close of project. Buying shop materials. For agricultural tours. In case of sickness. For buying live stock.

Membership—Any boy taking vocational agriculture in Debono school is eligible to join. If thrown out for violating rules they will not be admitted again without these consent of the directors and all members present at the meeting. All members of the bank are stock holders.

Meetings—Meetings are held regularly once each week (Friday which is depositing day).

November 18, 1927 the boys met for the purpose of making their first deposit. At first the boys were not very interested in banking, so Mr. Benson, instructor gave a short lecture on the value of savings. This put the students to thinking and they deposited almost one hundred per cent strong. Since that time the boys have met regularly and carried on their business in a business like way and taking a great interest in their bank.

The Thrift Bank is the best method for school boys to make savings. It is very beneficial to the agricultural boys as their course this year calls for banking. All the boys sincerely hope that they can deposit without any discomfort on their part, the regular amount each week.

We the students of the agricultural class and members of the Young Tar Heel Farmer organization, hope that every reader of the above article will give us hearty, and helpful cooperation with our bank and many other activities which we are putting on this year.
